Proposal for Sewers

Office of the Board of Local Improvements,
Highwood, March 31st, 1906.

Sealed proposals will be received by the Board of Local Improvements of the City of Highwood until five (5) o'clock P. M., April 14th, 1906 at the City Clerk's office in the City Hall in the City of Highwood, Lake County, Illinois, for the construction of the following proposed sewers, to-wit:

That a ten inch (10") vitrified tile pipe sewer with manholes and catch basins be laid in Waukegan Avenue from a connection with the eastern terminus of the twelve inch (12") sewer opposite Clay Avenue and be laid northerly to the north line of Washington Avenue.

That a ten inch (10") vitrified tile pipe sewer be laid in Waukegan Avenue from a connection with the eastern terminus of the twelve inch (12") sewer opposite Clay Avenue southerly to the center line of Highwood Avenue.

That an eight inch (8") vitrified tile pipe sewer be laid southerly in Waukegan Avenue from a connection with the southern terminus of the ten inch (10") sewer in the said Avenue at the center of Highwood Avenue and be laid southerly to the eastern limits of the City of Highwood.

That an eight inch (8") vitrified pipe sewer be laid in Highwood Avenue from a connection with the southern terminus of the ten inch (10") sewer in Waukegan Avenue west of Jeffrey's Place.

According to plans and specifications for each of said improvements, on file in the office of the Board of Local Improvements

Proposals must be made and addressed to the President of the Board of Local Improvements, endorsed "Proposals for Sewers," and be accompanied by cash or by certified check, payable to the President of the Board of Local Improvements on some responsible bank for an amount equal to 10 percent of the aggregate proposal.

Bids will be opened by the Board of Local Improvements at 5.30 o'clock P. M., Saturday, April 14th, 1906.

For such labor and material the contractor is to be paid as above specified in special assessment bonds payable in ten (10) installments with interest at five per centum (5 per centum) per annum pursuant to the statute in such cases, made and provided.

The Board of Local Improvements reserves the right to reject any and all bids and to accept bids as applied to each street separately or to let the whole in bulk as the Board may elect.

No bids will be received later than 5 o'clock P. M. Saturday, April 14th, 1906.

No proposal will be considered unless the party offering it shall furnish evidence satisfactory to the Board of Local Improvements of his ability and that he has the necessary facilities together with sufficient pecuniary resources to fulfill the condition of the contract and specification, provided such contract shall be awarded him.

Companies or firms bidding, will give the individual names with their respective addresses as well as the name of the firm.
