

## HIGHLAND PARK NEWS-LETTER

### An Ordinance Providing for the Issuing of Bonds for Corporate Purposes

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Highland Park, County of Lake, and State of Illinois:

Section 1. That bonds of the City of Highland Park, to the amount of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6000.00) be issued as follows: Two Thousand Dollars (\$2000.00) due August 1st, 1908, Two Thousand Dollars due August 1st 1909 and Two Thousand Dollars (\$2000.00) due August 1st 1911. Said bonds shall bear interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, payable semi annually, both principal and interest to be payable at The First National Bank, Chicago, Ill.,

Section 2. Each bond shall be for the sum of not less than one hundred dollars (\$100.00), and not more than one thousand dollars (\$1000.00), the amount to be determined by the Finance Committee of the City Council of said city, and said bonds shall be issued and the proceeds thereof shall be used as follows; Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1500.00) for the repair and improvement of the City Hall or City Building of the City of Highland Park, and Forty Five Hundred Dollars (4500.00) for the construction of septic tanks for the sewerage system of said city.

Section 3. Said bonds shall be signed by the Mayor and City Clerk, and countersigned by the City Treasurer and shall have the corporate seal of said city affixed thereto, and said bonds shall be in the usual form of city bonds issued for similar purposes, as nearly as the circumstances of the case will allow, and there shall be attached to each of said bonds interest coupons, evidencing the semi annual interest to be paid upon the same.

Section 4. Said bonds shall bear the date August 1st, 1906, and the city Council of said city shall annually, commencing in the year 1906, provide, assess and levy a regular annual tax for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds, or so many of them as shall remain unpaid at the time the annual appropriation shall be made, and in addition thereto the city council shall in the years A. D. 1907, 1908 and 1910 respectively, provide for the assessment, appropriation, and levy of the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2000.00) for each of said years, which sums, when collected, shall be applied to pay the bonds falling due for the year when said tax is collected.

Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication.

### Annual Appropriation Bill

An Ordinance making Appropriations for Corporate Purposes for the Fiscal Year from May 1st, 1906 to April 30th, 1907.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Highland Park:

Section 1. That the following sums or so much thereof as may be authorized by law be and the same are hereby appropriated for corporate purposes for the fiscal year commencing May 1st, 1906, and ending April 30th, 1907.

#### STREETS, ALLEYS AND BRIDGES.

For constructing, maintaining and repairing streets, alleys and bridges. \$ 3,000.00

#### SEWERS

For constructing, maintaining and repairing Sewers \$ 1,000.00

#### STREET LIGHTING

For Street Lighting purposes \$ 4,000.00

#### PRINTING AND STATIONERY.

For Printing and Stationery purposes \$ 100.00

#### SALARY OF OFFICERS

For salaries of City Officers \$ 4,804.00

#### BOND AND INTEREST

For Bonded Indebtedness and interest falling due \$11,702.00

#### LIBRARY

For Public Library Purposes \$ 1,200.00

#### MISCELLANEOUS

For Miscellaneous Corporate Purposes not hereinabove enumerated \$ 920.00

TOTAL AMOUNT APPROPRIATED \$26,726.00

Section 2. All unexpended balances of any item or items of any general appropriation made by this ordinance may be expended in making up any deficiency in any item or items in the same general purpose or in like appropriation made by this ordinance.

Section 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith shall be and the same are hereby repealed.

Section 4. This ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication.
