The soldiers, who were led by Frank Donnel and Joseph Saplin broke open the boxes in the saloons of Ed J. Jones, J. B. Martin and Weinacht and W. J. Welch's cafe, and spent the money for drinks. They were informed upon by two negro soldiers who they invited to join them, and were arrested. Donnell and Saplin were charged with larceny, and bound over to the grand jury. Two other soldiers, known to have been implicated, received the maximum penalty for disorderly conduct, and were sent to the county jail to serve out their fines of \$200 each.
