Public notice is hereby given that the Board of Local Improvements of the City of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illinois, has filed in the County Court of Lake County, Illinois, a certificate that the following improvement has been completed, and that it conforms substantially to the requirements of the original ordinance for the construction of the same, to-wit: The construction of a cast iron lateral main water supply pipe, together with fire hydrant, shut off valves and special castings, to be constructed and laid along and under Kincaid Street, in said City, commencing at the intersection of Kincaid Street and Roger Williams Avenue, and connecting with the water main now laid in Roger Williams Avenue at a point in said main twelve (12) feet east of the center line of said Kincaid Street, thence southerly along Kincaid Street on a line parallel with and twelve (12) feet east of the center line of said Kincaid Street, to a point in said parallel line which would be intersected by the south line of lot one hundred eleven (111), south Highland Addition to said City of Highland Park, produced westerly in its course across said Kincaid Street, Highland Park Special Assessment of said Court Docket Number 105, and also certifying to the cost thereof and the amount estimated that is required to pay accruing interest on Bonds and Vouchers issued to anticipate collection of said assessment and that application has been made to said Court to consider and determine whether or not the facts stated in said certificate are true. That a hearing will be had upon said application on Monday the Fourth day of February A. D. 1907, at the hour of ten (10) o'clock in the forenoon of said day, at the County Court Room of said Court, in the County Court House, at Waukegan, in said Lake County.

## The Glee Club Concert

It is very desirable to have a large collection of views illustrating the geography of Highland Park and the north shore, the flowers, trees, bird life, the work of running water, the waves, etc. With a collection of this sort it would be possible to arouse in children more strongly than has been done here a wholesome interest in the beautiful things in their environment."
