Absolutely pure maple syrup, not maple sugar and water, but syrup that has been boiled down from the clear pure maple sap is difficult to secure and it is also expensive. The Craftsman's Guild has arranged to secure a small quantity direct from a maple orchard in Vermont and will offer it to their patrons (as long as it lasts). This syrup will be packaged in full size pint and quart bottles at thirty-five cents the pint and sixty cents the quart. Orders are now being booked and will be filled in rotation as received. Deliveries will be made in Chicago and suburbs free of charge but on orders for outside points express will be charged extra.
