A Test Case

A move is on foot by the electric roads of the country to compel the steam lines to interchange traffic with them. The first step was taken Monday, when the Chicago and Milwaukee Electric Railroad comdany filed with the interstate commerce commission a petition against the Illinois Central and the Yazoo and Mississippi Valley rail roads to compel them to enter into joint rate and traffic arrangements.

The case will be a test' and its prosecution before the commission is arousing a great deal of interest. The petition is filed under section 5 of the commerce act, which gives the commission the power to establish through and joint rates This power has not been exercised.

The question of enteging into traffic relations with electric roads has been discussed many times before the various traffic associations. As a rule there is an agreement between the railroads not to have any business relations with the electric lines, but in several cased this has not been adhered to.

Several roads at various times, in the effort to secure more business, have put in joint rates with connecting electric lines. The effort to boycott them on the part of the steam roads is due largely to the fact that the electric roads have cut into the passenger revenue of the steam lines materially by reducing rates.

By putting in through rates and division with the electric lines, it is stated, the steam roads would have to materially reduce their tariffs which they are unwilling to do. If the commission should see fit to compel such through rates it would undoubtedly have the effect of lowering freight schedules in many parts of the country. It is declared the Illinois Central will fight the petition vigorously.—Waukegan Gazette. Board of Local Improvements of the City of Highland Park.
