Bishop Hartzler D. D., the senior bishop of the church called the conference to order at 8 a. m. According to a beautiful custom of the church the session was ushered in by the celebration of the communion of the Lord's Supper. After a powerful address by the chairman in which the work of the past year was reviewed, the conference proceeded to organize. After several ballots had been taken the Rev. D. A. Thomas was elected secretary. The following business was transacted. The character and standing of the ministers and lay delegates was inquired into in the executive session. The chairman announced the usual standing of the committees, through which the principal work of the conference is done. Conference adjourned at 11:30 after song and prayer. At 2:30 the chairman called the meeting to order. Devotions being conducted by the Rev. J. H. Keagle of the Cedarville charge, business was then taken up. The presiding elders of the four districts made their reports which were very encouraging and full of interest. Opening for new appointments were reported by the elder. It was gratifying to the conference to hear of the growth of the work and of the number of conversions and accessions on the respective fields of labor. Resolutions were presented from the ministerial association and the executive committee of the Chicago Keystone League of Christian Endeavor recommending that a new mission be taken up at Oak Park and a pastor be sent to take charge of the same. The Rev. S. L. West manager of the publishing interests of the church at Harrisburg, Pa., was present. It a pleasure to the conference to hear of the continued success and added prosperity of this important branch of the church. The conference adjourned at 4 o'clock to give place to a lecture as announced.

Dr. Breau, pastor of the Church of the Covenant, Chicago, and also president of the Chicago branch of the American Bible League, gave a very touching and eloquent lecture on, "The Saintliness of David Brainrod," after which the conference ad-

journed.


