On Tuesday afternoon, the members of the Highland Park Woman's Club and their friends, listened to perhaps the most interesting speakers of the entire year Mrs. Sueji Miyamore, a native born Japanese woman, who is attending the Chicago University, was the lecturer. She has been in this country several years and has graduated from Ann Arbor, in several branches. Her subject was "Japan, It's Customs, Class Distinction, Education" and then she answered any number of questions on general information about the country. She described the dress of the higher class of Japanese, as being absolutely genuine that is, they wear nothing that is an imitation of anything better, always the best. Their idea of the classes seemed queer to us. They judge high and low by their ideas of morals and not of birth. All merchants and men, who are earning money are classed as low because of their greed for money, regardless of their birth or other claims to position. The education of young women of Japan is in three branches, first the better class are instructed in the art of making and serving tea, and second, the arrangement of flowers, which we all know the maidens of the east have made an art all their own, then third, the upper classes are taught to play musical instruments and the lower classes are instructed in sewing. However, sewing is taught to all to a certain extent.

The object of her stay in this country is to gather enough money together to establish a home for the aged women in Japan, such as we have in this country. In four years there is to be a World's Fair and she is planning to take a party of tourists back with her and act as their guide.
