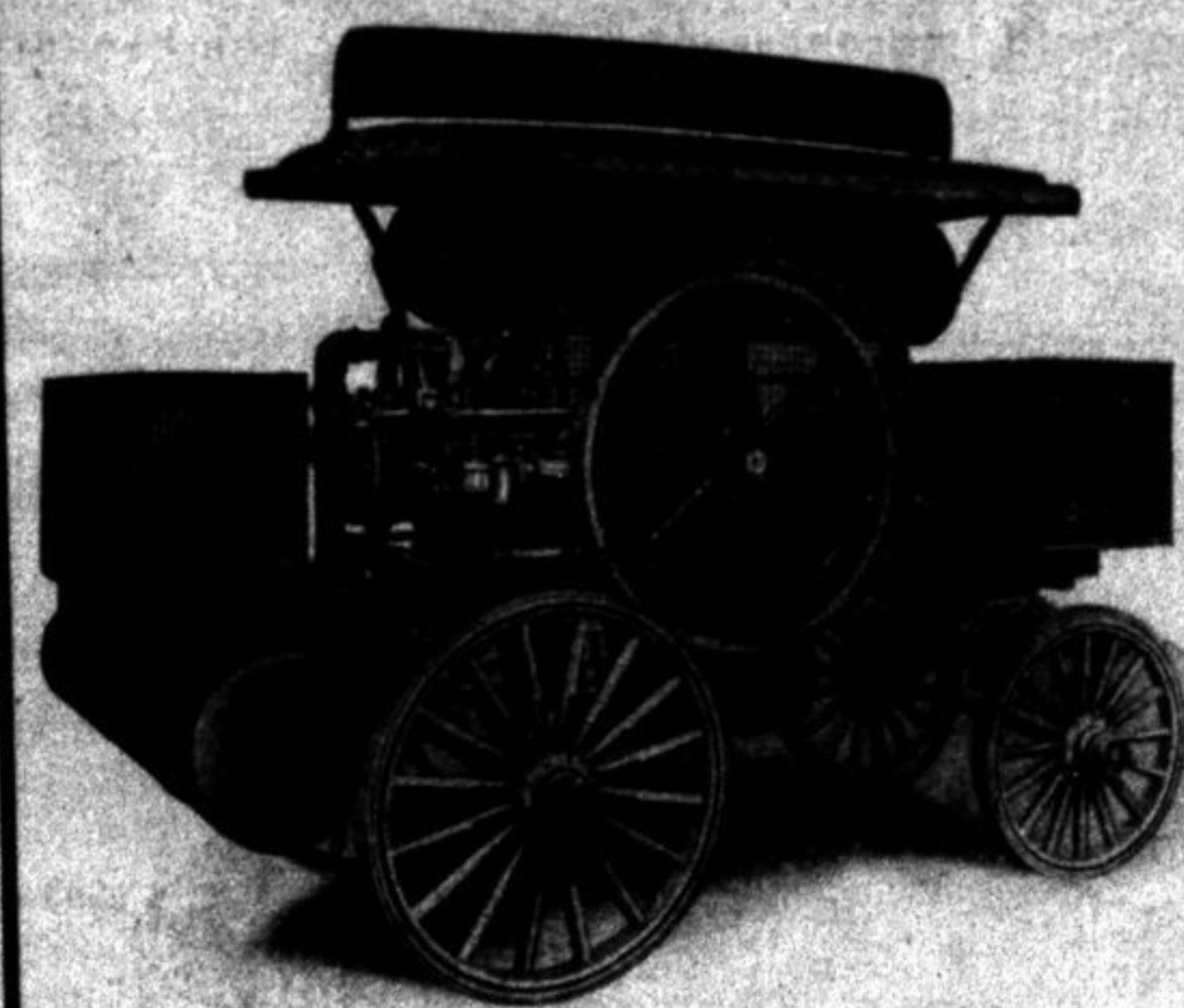
The lecture given last Saturday evening for the Grammar school, under the auspices of the Ossli, was a great success. Mr. Mills talk was very interesting to all.
