Is It True or Not?

We quote the following from last week's issue of the "Champion of Fair Play"—to use its own description of itself—"A Journal Devoted to the Interests of the Retail Liquor Trade:"

"In the selection of Mr. Fred Busse for Mayor of Chicago, no mistake has been made, and the liquor trade can rest assured that they have nothing to fear in the next four years. . . . His health which for some time has not been very good, seemed to give out and he proved unable to withstand the change of climate. On Wednesday he seemed slightly worse and a doctor was called, but could do nothing and his death occurred early the follow morning. He had many warm friends, all of whom were looking forward to his homecoming and his stories of his experiences, he being a most interesting story-teller and a very well read and well informed man.

He leaves one son, Charles, living in Kankakee, and six daughters. Mrs. James Conorton, Mrs. L. Gail, Mrs. E. S. Gail, Miss Lizzie, Mae and Maud Collins all of this place.

The funeral was held today and the burial was at Waukegan.
