Miss Pease leaves to mourn her, besides her parents, a twin sister, several other sisters and brothers, and a large circle of friends and relatives. She was in the Sophomore class of Deerfield Township High School, and proved an industrious and exemplary pupil. The esteem in which she was held by her classmates has been demonstrated by a floral tribute to her memory. The father of the deceased was for a long the trustee of this school, and was one of the chief instigators in getting the new building.

The funeral will be held at the Pease residence at 10 o'clock Saturday morning, April 20th.
