#### REPORT OF COUNCIL MEETING.

E. H. Willman was reappointed treasurer for the ensuing year. The committee to whom the petition of John Horenberger had been referred, reported that it was contrary to the ordinances to give him a license. The sidewalk rebates due were then read. The total amounted to \$357.45. They were ordered paid.

The question of whether or not to continue lighting the street lamps, was discussed. It was found the cost for one year was \$739.53. John P. Schneider made a motion to continue lighting the lamps. The motion did not carry. C. W. Pettis then made a motion to leave the town in darkness until September 1. This was carried.

An ordinance was introduced by C. W. Pettis to raise the saloon license to \$750. The bill was referred to Judiciary and License committee with power to call a special meeting to act on it.

An ordinance was introduced to provide a salary of \$25 a year to the President of the Board and \$15 a year to each trustee. The bill was referred to Finance committee. The meeting adjourned to next Monday.
