

from sick or diseased cows, or cows fed on refuse or slops from distilleries, breweries, vinegar factories or any mash or refuse, or food that has been subject to fermentation, or that may effect or be detrimental to life or health, shall upon discovery thereof, be confiscated, forfeited, and immediately destroyed by or under the direction of the Board of Health, Sanitary Superintendent, or Police Officer detailed for that purpose.

SECTION 18. Nothing in this article shall be so construed as to prohibit the use or sale of what is known as butter milk, provided the same is produced from pure and whole-ome milk. Should any such butter milk, however, be sold or offered for sale in the city, or be in the custody, or possession of any person or corporation in the city with the intent of selling or offering for sale, the same, which is not the product of pure and wholesome milk, or which is impure or adulterated, such person or corporation shall be fined not less than five dollars nor more than two hundred dollars for each offense.

SECTION 19. Every person or corporation owning, keeping, or in possession, charge, or control of any cow stable or place where milk cows are stabled or kept in the City, shall clean or cause to be cleaned such cow stables or place daily, in a thorough manner. All cow stables shall be thoroughly lighted with windows and ventilated, and at least twice a year shall be thoroughly cleansed as regards the walls, partitions and ceilings, which shall be white washed with lime wash containing some effective disinfectant. No horse manure or other manure shall be used for bedding.

Any person or corporation violating any of the provisions of this section shall be fined not less than five dollars nor more than one hundred dollars for each offense.

SECTION 20. If any cow be sick or diseased, the owner or person in charge thereof shall not sell, offer for sale, or expose for sale, the milk or cream therefrom but shall at once destroy such milk or cream. Any such owner or person who shall violate any of the provisions of this section shall be fined not less than twenty-five dollars nor more than one hundred dollars for each offense.

SECTION 21. No person or corporation shall sell or offer for sale any milk or cream drawn from any cow within fifteen days before or five days after parturition of such cow, nor shall any person or corporation cause or permit any milk or cream drawn from any cow within either of the periods named to be mixed with any other milk or cream.

Any person or corporation violating any of the provisions of this section shall be fined not less than five dollars nor more than two hundred dollars for each offense.

SECTION 22. Every person or corporation owning or keeping a dairy in the city shall maintain the premises thereof free from any accumulation of refuse matter or offal. Any person or corporation failing to comply with this section shall be fined not less than five

dollars nor more than two hundred dollars for each offense.

SECTION 23. No person or corporation shall keep or have in his or its possession any slops or refuse, of any distillery, brewery, vinegar factory, or any mash or refuse, or food that has been subject to fermentation for the purpose of feeding the same to any milk cow or cows. Any person or corporation violating any of the provisions of this section shall be fined not less than ten dollars nor more than one hundred dollars for each offense.

SECTION 24. Any officer or employe of the City of Highland Park who wilfully connives at or assists in a violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall on conviction thereof be punished by a fine of not less than one hundred dollars nor more than two hundred dollars, and shall at once forfeit his office.

SECTION 25. Whenever in the judgment of the Board of Health it shall be deemed necessary to cause an inspection of any sick or diseased cow or the herd wherein such sick or diseased animal is found, he may engage a veterinary inspector to act with him in making such inspection, and if after any careful inspection of any cow or cows found to be sick or diseased with any contagious or infectious disease, or with any malady which in the judgment of the said Board of Health would of necessity render the milk unwholesome for human food the affected cow or cows shall be removed if in a herd or place where it is likely to spread or cause contagion or infection therefrom, either temporarily or permanently, as such Board of Health may deem necessary or conducive to producing wholesome milk. If a diseased cow is by the Board of Health deemed incurable and the owner or person in charge thereof does not consent to its being killed, the Board of Health shall notify the State Board of Live Stock Commissioners for the slaughter of such animal. A violation of this section shall be deemed a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof the offender shall be fined not less than five dollars nor more than one hundred dollars.

SECTION 26. The milking of all cows shall be done in the most cleanly manner, and the milk shall be strained through wire cloth strainers of 100 meshes to an inch, and thoroughly cooled immediately after it is drawn from the cow, by frequently stirring the same until the animal heat is expelled and the temperature of said milk is reduced to 58 degrees (inside of 45 minutes) by placing the can in which it is contained in a vat of cold water, the water to be of sufficient depth to come up to the height of the milk in the can, and said vat shall contain at least three times as much water as the milk to be cooled, the water of such vat to be renewed daily in sufficient quantities to prevent any fouling or smell.

SECTION 27. The owners, keepers, or persons in charge or control of any dairy or place where milk or cream is kept stored or prepared for delivery, or of any stable, barn or building or

field where cows are kept, shall permit the Board of Health, the Sanitary Superintendent, or any police officer of the city of Highland Park to inspect or examine the same or any cows or cattle located therein, at any hour in the day time between seven o'clock in the morning and seven o'clock at night, in order to determine whether or not the provisions of this ordinance are being complied with and such owner, person in charge or control of said premises, place or property or any other person or persons who shall refuse to permit the said Board of Health, or any member thereof, or said sanitary superintendent or any police officer of the city of Highland Park, to enter into or inspect any of said places, barns, dairies, houses or the cattle or cows therein contained or who shall interfere with or resist any such person making or seeking to make any such inspection, shall be fined in the sum of not less than five dollars nor more than two hundred dollars for each offense.

SECTION 28. That all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 29. That sections 136 to 140, both inclusive, of an ordinance of said city entitled "An ordinance revising and consolidating the general ordinances of the City of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illinois" passed April 29, 1898, be, and the same are hereby repealed.

SECTION 30. Any person or persons, firm or corporation, who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance

where no specific penalty has been imposed, shall be fined in the sum of not less than five dollars nor more than two hundred dollars for each offense.


In addition to any of the penalties in this ordinance imposed the Board of Health may in its discretion, revoke the license of any vendor of milk or cream who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance.

SECTION 31. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and publication.
