

## Special Assessment Notice

Special warrant No. 116.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the County Court of Lake County, Illinois has rendered judgement for a special assessment upon property benefited by the following improvement:

The grading, draining, paving with macadam and otherwise improving a system of streets in the city as follows: Deerfield Avenue from the westerly line of the paved roadway on Green Bay Road, thence westerly to the westerly corporate limits of said city; Hickory Street from the southerly line of the paved roadway on Central Avenue, thence southerly along said Hickory Street and Hickory Street produced, to and joining with the northerly line of the paved roadway herein provided for, to be built on Deerfield Avenue; McGovern Street from the southerly line of the paved roadway on Central Avenue, thence southerly along McGovern Street and McGovern Street produced, to and joining with the paved roadway herein provided to be built on Deerfield Avenue; Laurel Avenue from the westerly terminus of the present macadam pavement on said Laurel Avenue thence westerly along said Laurel Avenue produced, to and joining with the paved roadway herein provided for, to be built on Hickory Street as will more fully appear from the certified copy of the judgment on file in my office. That the warrant for the collection of such assessment is in the hands of the undersigned.

All persons interested are hereby notified to call and pay the amount assessed at the collector's office, D. M. Erskine & Co's Bank, Central Avenue, Highland Park, Illinois, within thirty days from the date hereof.

Notice is further given that said assessment is divided into 10 instalments; That the amount of the First Installment is \$2,127.09 and that each of the remaining installments is \$190.00. That all installments draw interest at the rate of five (5) per cent per annum from May 25th, 1907.

The first installment is payable on the First day of January, A. D. 1908.

The second installment one year thereafter and so on annually until all installments are paid.
