

GREAT DISASTER IN CANADA

Eighty-four Men Perish

As we go to press we learn of the terrible fall of one-half the giant cantilever bridge in course of construction over the St. Lawrence River six miles from Quebec. The bridge was well on the way to completion, and on Thursday afternoon one-half of it collapsed, carrying with it into the river many of the workmen. Of the eighty-four who perished many were American workmen.

The disaster is felt to be a national calamity over the whole of Canada.

The bridge, which has been under construction for six years, was the greatest cantilever bridge in existence, and it was expected that it would prove an important factor in developing eastern Canada.
