Oct. 31. William Yager (31) of a well known family at Highland Park west, died at Elgin of pneumonia. He was buried at St. Mary's cemetery, Rev. Father Morrissy conducting the services.

Besides a host of friends he leaves to mourn his loss three sisters, Mrs. Frank Haben of Prairie View, Mrs. Elizabeth Clayton and Catherine Yager of Highland Park and two brothers, A. H. Yager of Highwood and Frank Yager of Chicago.

The Late Mr. George Elvey.

The funeral services of Mr. George Elvey were held at the family residence Monday, November 4, 1907. Rev. P. C. Wolcott and Rev. H. F. Evans officiated. Interment at Lake Forest.

Mr. Elvey was born June 29, 1836, in the village of Chicago, near historic Fort Dearborn.

It is understood that he was the third white child born in Chicago. His parents came from England the previous year. The family lived during succeeding years at Evanston and Northfield. Mr. Elvey married Mrs. Elizabeth Cepley May 8, 1866, at Northfield, Ill. They came to Highland Park 34 years ago and have lived here continuously until his death at noon last Friday, Nov. 1, 1907. He was thus 71 years and 4 months old. Mr. Elvey leaves a brother Charles Elvey, of Grand Junction, Mich., his widow and three children, Luke, Grace and Mrs. R. G. Evans, to mourn his death.

It is a comfort to them in the hour of their bereavement to recall his life of faithfulness to his family and his community.

He was unusually reserved in matters of the inner life not often expressing himself on religion. His hatred of sham and hypocrisy was marked and in his own life he showed forth the fruits of a life founded on an unheralded belief in God and eternal life.
