Mr. Lowrie has written a good book, placing his situations well and supplying his characters with bright lines but it is in the lyrics that he excels. Set to the beautiful music Mr. Gibler has supplied, they proved a positive treat.

Mr. Williams and Mr. Prior as Valentine and Milyuns spoke the bulk of the lines and carried the burden of the larger scenes. Those, with Miss Aldridge, whose Aunt Felicia was especially good and who sang effectively, being probably the best hits of the performance. Kenneth King in the low comedy part of Pat kept the audience roaring from the time his red head showed above the wall until his final exit. Mr. Lovell had the usual tenor part which requires only the ability to look well and make love. Miss Miller as Felicia, the tenor's adored one, looked and acted in a way which explained the tenor's adoration. Her one song was sweetly sung, accompanied by a neat little dance and by play with Helen who sat on a table and broke up the arrows remaining. Jane and Billy, as played by Miss Bell and Mr. Iredale, were a pair of diverting youngsters continually stirring up trouble. Mr. Iredale sang two numbers in a manner that added much to their popularity. Miss Bell's one number was the novelty of the program, she reciting about the Firefly who wooed the Moon. During this number the orchestra played a soft obligato and eight girls dressed in black and yellow danced as the lights flashed off and on. These girls, the Misses Marjorie Bell, Dorothy Clark, Edna Van Riper, Helen Greull, Helen Conrad, Alice Warner, Helen Murrie and Kathleen Bergen were the Bell Hops of Act I, and the way they danced in and out delivering notes and carrying baggage was a constant delight. The grace and beauty displayed by Mr. Milyun's daughters made plausible the immediate captivation of the three

officers. These small parts were all admirably done by Eddie Conrad as Capt. Wonder, Oliver Schaefer as Dennis. Misses Gertrude Haskins, Alice Maroney and Gertrude Blumenhaus as the daughters, and Messrs. Arthur Steele, Paul Gilroy and Archie Abercrombie as the Major, Capt. and Lieut. The Major's drinking scene being particularly good and the Lieutenant's song in which he introduces the soldiers to the cooks was done in a spirited manner by Mr. Abercrombie. This number brought forth the big laugh of the evening when Helen Coale as the awkward cook convulsed the audience. The Misses Mary Wolcott, Magdaline McNeill, Myrtle Wenban, Elizabeth Kemp, Madge McCaffroy, Mary Clark, Lillie Bell, Florence Shelton, Catherine Sullivan, Mary King, Gertrude Schaefer, Frances Fox and Messrs. Harry Boch, Frank Shelton, Percy Prior, Roland Brand, Edwin Maechtle, Roger Wolcott, Bert Brand, Arthur McCaffrey, Norris Panott, Henry Coale and Harold Steele formed the chorus.

The stage settings were all effective and the small attention to detail and smoothness reflect great credit on Mr. Lowrie who directed the stage, and Mr. Gibler who directed the orchestra.
