## A NOBLE STAND FOR LIFE One Hundred College Boys Sing While The Fire Rages in A Boston Theatre A Highland Park Youth Among Them

At one of the principal theatres of Boston a few days ago 120 of the college boys of Amherst held as many of the best seats in the house. Suddenly the lights went out and the next moment the whole ceiling of the great building was aflame. That awful cry of fire, which sets men and women in sudden alarm, was instantly heard ringing through the great building and a mighty stampede was made for the doors to the imminent danger of the entire crowd. The first impulse of the college boys was to join in the mad rush for life and thus increase the excitement and danger, but one of them, with vocal force struck up a college song. The spirit of the song arrested the second thought and every one of the young fellows caught up the strain and standing in their places sang the song through. Meantime the firemen had reached the scene and throwing great volumes of water upon the ceiling it fell upon the boys and drenched them to the skin. Still they held on, capturing the attention of many of the theatre throng until the fire was extinguished. We have the facts of this remarkable story of heroic from the father of one of the young men of the 120, a well known citizen of Highland Park, (we do not know that we are warranted in publishing the name). But the facts are given in a letter from the college boy to his father received this week. It was a brave deed. No one can estimate the value of it. Men, women and children will never be able to tell to what extent these courageous lads saved the lives of that crowd of pleasure seekers.
