"Former State Senator, Frederick C. DeLang, of Glencoe, is an old resident of the North Shore district, coming to Chicago from Albany, New York with his parents in 1857. He attended the old Franklin School and Rush Medical College; resided on Sedgwick street for 26 years, on Fullerton ave., 10 years, and in

Glencoe fourteen years. He was Secretary and principal promoter of the Lake View annexation movement which was carried to success, and Lake View was made the 24th and 26th Wards of the City of Chicago. Naturally an active worker, he was elected the first secretary of the new 25th Ward Republican Club, and presented the club with its charter.
