FACTS ABOUT OUR SCHOOLS

The recent Collinwood school disaster has called forth the inspection of school houses all over the country. We are pleased to report the following facts of the Highland Park Grammar school.

The average attendance for the month of January was 439.

It takes only fifteen seconds for this number of children to get out of the building in answer to the fire alarm of which they are notified before hand. Otherwise they would clear the building in less time.

There are four large exits all broader than the stairways which lead to them. These stairways are strait and it would be almost impossible for the children to fall and become jammed as was in the case of the Collinwood school.

The South exit is 125 feet from the Northeast exit, which gives a long hallway by which the children can be kept in line. All the doors are double and swing outward.

In accordance with instructions from the Board of Education, the Principal has devised a new system of alarm signals, so that pupils can be directed if necessary through certain exits rather
