### THE CHURCHES

**Trinity.** Last Thursday Bishop Anderson made his annual visitation and confirmed a class of eight at the Trinity church. The church was filled with a large congregation. At 7:45 the choir marched in, followed by those to be confirmed, the girls dressed in white and the vestments of the choir and clergy making an impressive sight. The beautiful Episcopal confirmation service was then read after which Bishop Anderson addressed a few remarks to those just confirmed. In his sermon Bishop Anderson characterized the faults of the whole christian church as that of "superficiality."

The services on Sunday will be held at 7:30 a. m. At 11 a. m. the regular service will be conducted with special music and at 4:30 p. m. the children's service will be held.

Early the morning of Tuesday search was again taken up by friends and the body of Mr. Brown was found lying face upwards by James Bowden Jr. Mr. Brown had been complaining all day Monday to friends that he was not feeling well. He was a gardener by trade and had gone on his way home presumably to look at a grove of Maple trees just south of Mr. Hatley's residence where he was found. The Waukegan Sun is in error about Mr. Brown being Judge Grosscup's gardener. The Coroner's Jury brought in a verdict of death from natural causes. The funeral services were held Thursday afternoon at 1:30 from the residence conducted by the Rev. Mark Sanborn assisted by Judge

The Captain of the tug identifies the body as that of Jacobson, who was one of the men lost on the ill-fated vessel.
