REV. E. LEROY DAKIN

Rev. E. Leroy Dakin who becomes Pastor of the Highland Park Baptist Church, is a native of Nova Scotia. After graduating from the Acadia University in 1902, he had charge of a church at Annapolis Royal, Nova Scotia.

In 1903 he was called to the Emanuel Church, Victoria, where he remained four years. In March of this year he entered the University of Chicago, for a special course. The Victoria Daily Colon writes of his work and influence:

"The retiring pastor has shown considerable genius in organizing.

In connection with the church the senior and junior societies, as well as a strong boy's club, are all doing excellent work. Outside of his church work Mr. Dakin has been very active. He was for one year president of the Ministerial Association and has during the past year been president of the citizens league of which body he has been one of the moving spirits since its incep-

tion. Besides this Mr. Dakin has had the honor of having organized a provincial B. Y. P. U. also having organized a provincial Christian Endeavor Society and being its President for the first year. For nearly three years he has been manager of the "Western Baptist," the provincial organ of the Baptist denomination, being also editor of the same journal.

As a strong forcible speaker who commands the attention of his audience and as an earnest christian worker, as well as an advanced thinker, Mr. Dakin will be much missed."

With such recommendations, strongly endorsed by general testimony, Mr. Dakin comes to the Highland Park Baptist Church to serve as its pastor in connection with his university studies.

Mr. Dakin is a good speaker—a preacher of the expository order with a fine appreciation of anecdote and parable, and a fair measure of the exhorting quality.

Geo. W. Turner is a man of an honorary fellowship at this mark in Highland Park. His College which is credited as one temporary resignation from public office as Alderman of this city, is probably due to a desire for a years rest. He has served this city in the Council for six years, and has been an active worker in such offices as, chairman of the Street and Alley Committee and member of the Board of local Improvements, and he is still a member of the Board of Education School district 107 and chairman of its Finance Committee.

Mr. Turner was born in 1872; at the age of 15 he graduated from the High School and then studied for two years at Ann Arbor University. His chosen profession being that of a Veterinary, he went to the College of Toronto, where he graduated in 1892. He earned

an honorary fellowship at this College which is credited as one of the best on the Continent. Mr. Turner commenced practice at Delphos Ohio, where he received an appointment from the Secretary of War in January 1903. His army record would fill a small volume, and within the last sixty days the authorities at Washington have offered him the most responsible and highest paid position in the Army Veterinary service. Mr. Turner's record as Alderman of the second ward is notable.

He is a man of opinions on public questions, is always ready to express them, and back them with his vote. It is an open secret that he is regarded as a fitting candidate for the office of Mayor of the City next term.
