**Black Newspaper Suggested** Wisconsin print paper manufacturers says that we may come to the using of black paper printing with white ink. The chief points advanced in favor of this proposition are the preservation of forests, the saving of millions of dollars annually in pulp wood, and the reduction of prices of print paper to perhaps one-half the present price. Black paper can be made of old and used newspapers, and, in fact, almost any fibrous stock, while white paper requires spruce or hemlock.

The proposition may be brought to the attention of Eastern print paper manufacturers and the publisher at the close of the congressional investigation in Washington. From "The Pathfinder" Washington D. C.

The various members of the High School Varsity squad have all worked hard during the season. More athletic enthusiasm has been shown during the past year than at any time during the school history with the result that championship teams have been developed in football and basketball and it seems in baseball. A large portion of the credit for this must be given Athletic Director A. R. Williams. As catcher "Billy O Neill" is undoubtedly the best backstop since the days of Prior and Eckhart. A good hitter, fast on the bases, with a keen baseball head. O Neill is one of the mainstays of the squad. "Hutch" is very fast on the bases, and is a fair batter.

Third base is covered by William Mc Nanly. His most spectacular work this season was a difficult one-handed catch of a line drive in the University High School game. Egbert Spencer is in left field and is very voracious toward all flies coming his way. Willis Griffin is in center-field and heads the batting order. Griffin is a good pinch hitter and is also good for his ability to get on bases. Oscar Bell cavorts in right field. He is right "up and coming" and with another years experience will make a star. Glenn Maris is the general utility outfielder and has been spectacular ball wherever he has played. The whole team in short will go down in the annals of the Deerfield Township High School as one of the best she ever had.
