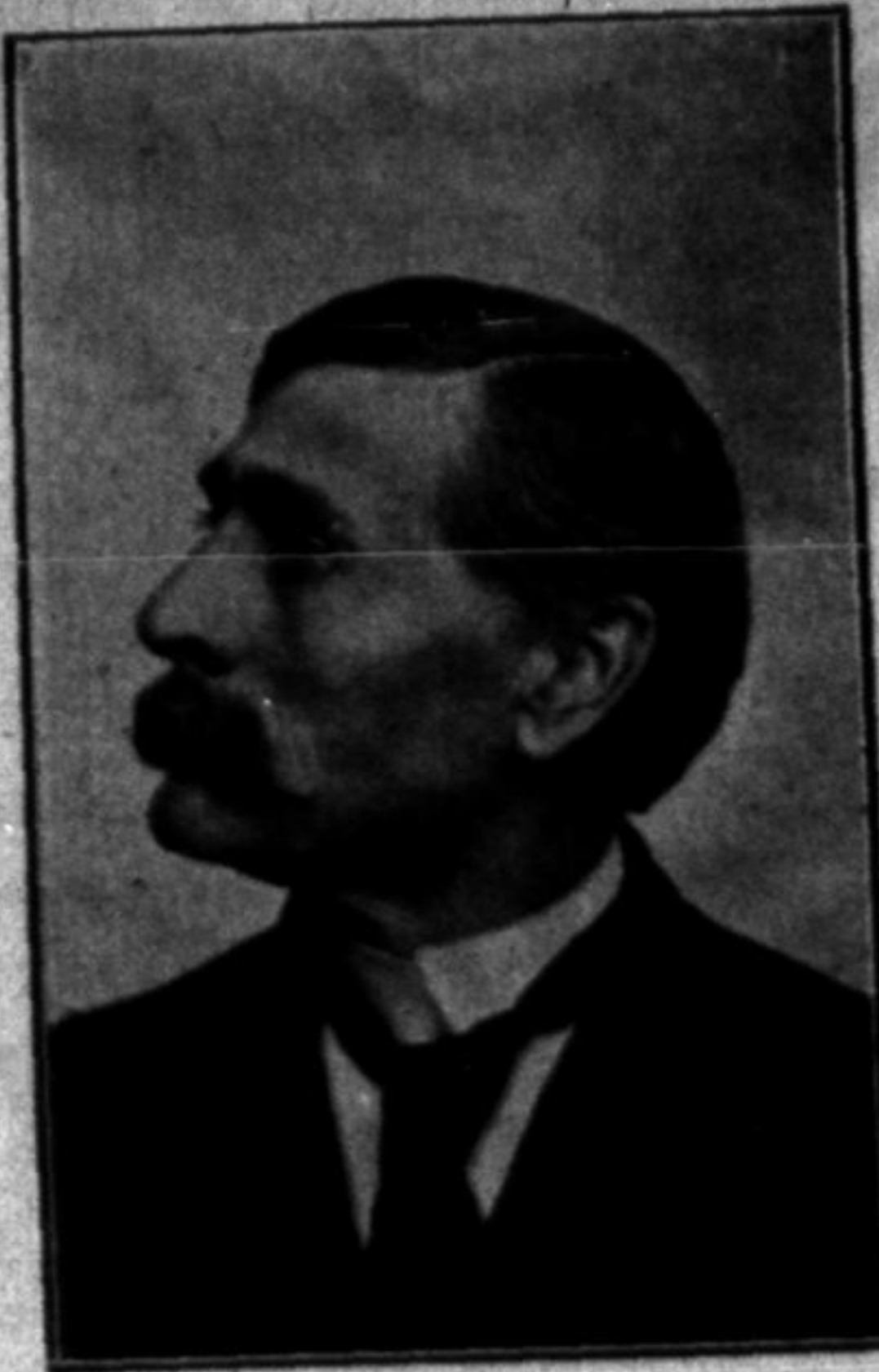

W. E. BRAND, M. A.

One of Highland Park's citizens, who has distinguished himself in the realm of art, is Prof. W. E. Brand whose studio is at 15 Sheridan Road. On the twenty-ninth day of June, last, Mr. Brand finished his fifth year with the Columbia Conservatory of Art in Aurora, Ill. During that period the school has twice enlarged its quarters, until the number of its music and art pupils now reach the total of 550.

Professor Brand has been at the head of the art department and has also been elected a Director and Vice President and one year served as President of the Conservatory. Last year the school changed hands, Prof. Hamilton taking a Directorate at Toledo, Ohio, and Prof. Detweiler, of Bush Temple, succeeding him.

Prof. Brand was one of 22 of the staff of Instructors, re-elected to succeed themselves. In 1903-4 he secured leave of absence to visit the great art centres of Europe and studied the great masters in England, Holland, Germany and France, and upon his return was honored with the title of Master of Arts.

He was re-elected in June, last, for the coming year.

PROHIBITION CANDIDATE

A. C. Manley of Harvard a Candidate for State Senator

Marengo, Aug. 31.—At a meeting of the Senatorial committee for the eighth district held here to-day A. C. Manley of Harvard was nominated for State Senator to fill the vacancy caused by the withdrawal of A. B. Lucas of Crystal Lake. The prohibitionists claim they have a chance to elect their candidate for Senator. Mr. Lucas was unable to devote the necessary time to the campaign, so that Mr. Manley was nominated. The Senatorial Committee organized by the election of Henry Shepard of Gurnee as chairman and A. B. Lucas as Secretary. C. W. Earl of Belvidere is the other member. The prohibitionists say that the election of their candidate for Representative, Joseph E. Anderson of Lake Forest, is assured and that it is now only a question of majority.
