The following very remarkable item was clipped recently from an old news paper by a well known citizen Highland Park and handed to us. W. publish it without comment as a curi-"YE SCAMP, W. PENN."

Mrs. Juliet S. Riley, of Muncie, Ind., has in her possession a letter written by Cotton Mather, one of the first Governors of the colony of Massachusetts to John Higginson. It is dated Bo ton, 1682, and was handed down to Mrs. Riley from her ancestors, who were Puritans, residing in New Eng land. The epistle is probably the old est document of its kind in the country, the Indianapolis News says. Its full text is as follows:

Sep 3rd 1682-To ye aged and beloved John Higginson. There be now at sea a skipper (for our friend Esaias Holderoft of London did advise me by the last packet that it would sail some time in August) called ye Welcome. R. Green was master, which has aboard a hundred or more of ye ley of the Rhone, and the hillsides heretics and malignants called Quakers, with W. Penn, who is ye scamp at ye head of them.

Ye General Court has accordingly given secret orders to master Malachi Huxtell of ye brig Porpoise to waylaye ye said Welcome as near ye coast of Codd as may be, and make captives of ye Penn, and his ungodly crew, so that ye Lord may be glorified, and not mocked on ye soil of this new country with ye heathen worshippe of these people. Much spoil can be made by selling ye whole lot to Barbadoes, where slaves fetch good prices in rumme, and sugar, we shall not only do ye Lord great service by punishing the Wicked but shall make gayne for his ministers and people.
