## A PHILOSOPHER OF SELF-BUILDING.

Less than a score of miles from Highland Park, on the Milwaukee Electric, A. F. Sheldon, president of the Sheldon School of Chicago, is building Sheldon University.

To Mr. Sheldon the present educational system is fundamentally wrong. He knows that it must be improved and he is absolutely confident that he has the system which will solve the problems which vex educators to-day.

It is his intention to build at Sheldonhurst, three miles west of Libertyville, a university wherein boys will be given True Education.

According to Mr. Sheldon true education consists in one process: the drawing out of the positive qualities of the body, intellect, sensibilities and will. This is accomplished in two ways: by exercising and by feeding.

To strengthen a muscle in one's arm, for instance, one exercises it continually. Unless one does this, that muscle will eventually atrophy and die. But to exercise is not enough. The body must be fed. It must be fed with nutritious food—not food that is unsightly or poisonous.

When a student is taught how to exercise his whole body in such a way that it is a perfect physical machine, then that student has an educated body. It responds to the demands he makes upon it.

In similar way, when one wishes to develop or strengthen a quality such as ambition, the thing to do is to exercise that quality and feed the mind with the mental food which will cause that quality to grow. In similar way the fifty-one other positives of the body, mind and soul are developed.

Of course it is known that the strengthening of one muscle is accompanied by the strengthening of some other muscles. No student can consciously undertake the "education" of any one part of his body or mind without strengthening in some way every other part, those most closely related, of course, receiving the greatest benefit.

In this school which will be erected on the shores of Lake Eara (shown in accompanying cut) the students will be taught two things. They will first be taught Health Building and Character Building. When all the positives of the body are developed that body is in perfect health, and when the positives of intellect, sensibilities and will are developed, it follows that one has a perfect character.

Character is that central magnetic force of true manhood and true womanhood, born of a combination of the positives, mental, moral, spiritual and physical.

The man who possesses Character and Health is a man with a strong personality. Personality is that power which inspires confidence, and confidence, we know, is at the bottom of every transaction. It follows that the man with the strongest personality will be successful, for he will have Ability, Reliability, Endurance and Action, the four prime requisites of success.

Success is perfect happiness.

The successful man has Health, Long Life, Money and Honor.

Sheldon University.

Mr. Sheldon, in building Sheldon Commercial University, has no intention of giving any of the students training which will enable them to go out immediately and secure high positions in the business world. His aim will be to train young men so that when they do engage in business they will have such control of themselves that they will speedily acquire the knowledge necessary to carry them to the top of any profession in which they choose to engage. In other words, these students will go out with strong bodies, capable of "staying in the game," and they will also possess an equipment mentally and spiritually which will enable them to see and grasp all opportunities for advancement they may desire.

This school will always be a small school in point of number of students. It is the contention of the founder that personal contact between student and teacher is necessary, and that it is impossible for any student to receive the attention due him in one of the larger colleges or universities. Mr. Sheldon himself is a graduate of Michigan University.

Two hundred and fifty students at one time will be all that will be accepted. Every effort will be made to select from among these young men money itself is no object to you.

who will go out into the world and will establish similar schools elsewhere. By this method the time will come when in almost every city in the world there will be schools devoted to the training of young men—and possibly women—in Character and Health Building.

It is also certain that text-books will be printed soon in which this system of education will appear in such shape that it can be introduced into the regular schools of the land. It was Froebel's intention to formulate a system which would take children from the kindergarten age upward. The Sheldon system has started with the parents and will be worked downward to the kindergarten. Our class in area (Ability, Reliability, Endurance and Action—A R E A) development has already been started by Mrs. Sheldon for the benefit of neighborhood children, while 32,000 students—whose average age is 42—have been enrolled in the correspondence course.

**Six Hundred Acres and a Lake.**

Six hundred acres of land have been purchased near Libertyville and a lake a mile long has already been made by constructing a dam across a little stream which flowed through a deep valley.

Five miles of drives have already been constructed. Thousands of visitors have already visited the place.

Auto and coaching parties from the lake shore cities have made Lake Eara their objective point many times during the past summer, while several Chicago clubs have held picnics there.

Next summer a two months' session will be held, at which lectures and musical entertainments will be given. Talks will be given by Mr. Sheldon, Elbert Hubbard and other big men. In addition there will be sports of all kinds. All students will live in tents and meals will be scientifically served on the grounds.

At Libertyville Mr. Sheldon publishes "The Business Philosopher," which serves as his special messenger. In this he preaches the gospel of the square deal, ever endeavoring to teach his readers that the Golden Rule can be applied to business building, and that ethics in business always pays big dividends.
