**CHARGE LAMPHERE  
HOUNDED WOMAN**

PROSECUTION OFFERS MORE TESTIMONY TO PROVE FARM-HAND GUILTY OF MURDER.

**MAXSON STICKS TO  
STORY OF THE FIRE**

Efforts of Attorneys for Defense to Shake Witness Are Unavailing—Grocery Clerk Tells of Oil Purchase by Mrs. Guinness.

LaPorte, Ind., Nov. 19.—In an effort to establish the fact that Lamphere was hounding Mrs. Guinness and making life miserable for her and to show definitely the date of the Helgelein murder, in the profits of which Lamphere is supposed by the prosecution to have shared and over the division of which it is contended Mrs. Guinness and Lamphere first fell out, the state Wednesday offered considerable evidence to the jury.

**Maxson Sticks to Story.**

Maxson's story of the fire, his own escape from the burning building and his efforts to get into the brick part, were told during the morning. Attempts on the part of the attorneys of the defense to cause him to change his story were unavailing. It was brought out that the oil can, brought home on the afternoon of April 27 by Mrs. Guinness, filled with kerosene and placed in the hallway of the frame part, was found after the fire on the floor in the middle of the cellar.

George Wrase, clerk in Minich's grocery where Mrs. Guinness bought her groceries the day before the fire, testified that Mrs. Guinness' purchase of two gallons of kerosene in a five-gallon can, was something unusual. While in the store Lamphere came in and bought some tobacco. He stared hard at Mrs. Guinness, but neither spoke, the woman apparently trying to keep away from him. Witness' opinion that they acted like they were enemies was excluded from the testimony. Wrase said that Lamphere went out doors and stood on the sidewalk and kept looking in the store until the woman left. The witness said there were tears in Mrs. Guinness' eyes when she returned after having been absent from the store a short time.

A memorandum book found on Lamphere, when arrested, was offered in evidence. Receipts given by Lamphere to Mrs. Guinness were also offered in evidence, the signatures being identified by John Wheatbrook. The purpose of offering these to the jury was to show the business relations between Mrs. Guinness and Lamphere and to establish the date of Lamphere's trip to Michigan City and the date of Helgelein's murder, January 14.

It became known Wednesday afternoon that Judge Ritcher was investigating a report that an attempt had been made to tamper with some of the state's witnesses.

**Court Again Crowded.**

The court was crowded again Wednesday by witnesses who expected to hear more about the love affairs of Mrs. Guinness and Lamphere.

"We have proved beyond doubt that Mrs. Guinness is dead and that it was her body that was found in the ruins of the fire with the bodies of the three children," said Assistant State Attorney Sutherland. "We have also introduced evidence to prove the threats made against Mrs. Guinness by Lamphere. We feel that we have proved every contention that we have set out to show. Lamphere's setting of the fire will next be shown."

**Defense Has No Fear.**

Attorneys for Lamphere say that they will not be worried if the state proves that Lamphere set fire to the house. Their contention is that Mrs. Guinness disposed of the children and then committed suicide, and that all were dead before the house was burned; consequently even if Lamphere set the fire a jury will have to acquit him of murder.

A fire insurance company has refused to pay the executor of the Guinness estate the face value of the policies, \$2,300, on the house and contents. It insists that the executor must show that Mrs. Guinness did not herself set fire to the house. It also contends that the place was used by the owner for illegal purposes.
