**POLITICS OF GLENCOE.**

As the spring election approaches in the village of Glencoe, intense interest is noticed among automobile owners and their friends, and it is centered in the selection of a village attorney, also a police magistrate to succeed the present incumbents, both of whom were much in evidence during the last summer. The magistrate is elected by the people; the attorney, however, is appointed by the village council and is paid a salary and fees.

Mr. Oscar J. West, consulting engineer of the Phoenix Bridge Company with offices in the Rookery, Chicago, is mentioned for the office of village president. Mr. West was nominated by his admirers in Glencoe last spring and came within a half dozen votes of being elected president. Mr. Calhoun may decide to be a candidate for re-election. All candidates must file petitions with the village clerk in proper form and time to have a place on the regular election tickets. The time for holding primaries is past.

**GRANDSON OF FOUNDER OF GLENCOE PASSES AWAY.**
