LOCAL IMPROVEMENT.
Judge Smiley, Acting County Judge at Waukegan in the absence of Judge Jones has confirmed the special assessment for paving Laurel and Prospect avenues from St. Johns avenue to the lake. This proceeding has been hanging fire in the County Court for some time. The Board of Local Improvement will now advertise bids and let the contract for the work which will begin within the next 30 days.
The judge also confirmed the special assessment for the paving of Central avenue from Green Bay Road to the C. & N. W. right-of-way. The Board of Local Improvements will also advertise for bids in this case and it is hoped that the improvement may go in early this spring. This improvement calls for a wide macadam roadway in front of the business houses and will be a very great improvement over the old dilapidated cedar block pavement.
All legal objections to the opening and widening of West Park avenue from Green Bay road to the city limits were over-ruled. Mr. E. S. Gail representing certain property owners made a stubborn contest upon legal objections.
The judge has fixed Monday the 22nd inst. at 10 a. m. for the jury trial on the question of land damages. The over-ruuling of the legal objections insures the completion of this improvement. The damages to the land being the only question left open for adjustment.

THE SCHOOL BOARD AND THE WOMAN'S CLUB.
Seventy ladies, members and guests, were present Tuesday last at a regular meeting of the "Highland Park Woman's Club." The subject of the day was "Erin-go-bragh," and the program, in charge of Mrs. Frank Green, sparkled with Irish wit and song.
In the few minutes devoted to business at the opening of the meeting, Mrs. George Cummings read a message from the "Illinois Federation" relating to matters educational. Mrs. Cummings' own comment was that since children have a persistent habit of choosing women for mothers, the community might choose a few women to serve on its boards of education.
She thought Highland Park could fittingly elect two women for that service next month, April 17. She expressed her own intention of withdrawing from such service now at the close of seven years of activity on the Highland Park board.

CITIZEN OR TRADE UNIONIST?
When William Brooks, a Westville coal miner, on March 16th sought naturalization in the court at Danville, Ill., Judge Wright asked him the questions: "If it came to a point, which I do not apprehend will ever happen, but if the union and the law should ever differ, which would you follow, the union or the law?" asked the court.
"The union," answered Brooks.
"You perhaps do not understand the question," continued the judge. "If the union differed from the law on any subject, would you follow the union or the law of the land?"
"The union," again responded the miner.
Judge Wright was astonished, but again thought he had been misunderstood. He put the question a third time, receiving the same answer. Then, waving the applicant for citizenship toward the door, the court said:
"I cannot admit this man to citizenship. No man who would follow the dictates of his trades union in preference to the law is fit to be a citizen of the United States, and no man will be admitted to citizenship by me with that feeling in his mind."
Judge Wright is to be commended for this action. Any man who will put loyalty to his union or lodge or even to his church above the law of his country should have permission to live in some other land.


