

ILLINOIS STATE NEWS

Springfield.—Among the bills introduced in the house is a measure presented by Representative Behrens to permit electric railways, whether organized under the railway act or under the state act applying to street railroads, to make traffic agreements with each other and to consolidate on a majority vote of the stock in each company in favor of the consolidation. The measure would permit the consolidation of street car companies with the interurban companies. Representative Jewell introduced a bill to exempt candidates for nomination for the supreme and circuit courts

Springfield.—A bill to require railroad companies to carry the troops of the National Guard at a rate of one cent a mile is under consideration by the sub-committee, headed by Representative Kittleman, to whom has been referred the military appropriation bills. These measures ask for \$50,000 additional for the transportation of troops, the necessity of the additional expenditure being caused by the refusal of the railways to make the old rate of one cent a mile. Since the passage of the two-cent fare act the railroads have insisted on the payment of full fare by the state. Charleston.-George Kizer, notorious

gambler and ex-saloonkeeper of Mattoon, was found guilty of bootlegging by a jury in the Coles county circuit court and Judge James W. Craig gave him the limit of law in fines and penalties. There 52 counts against Kizer, and his fine amounts to \$4,500 and 1,450 days in the county jail.
