Points of weakness in Mr. Everett's position however, became apparent and then the west side candidate went in to win and came in at a canter by a neck.

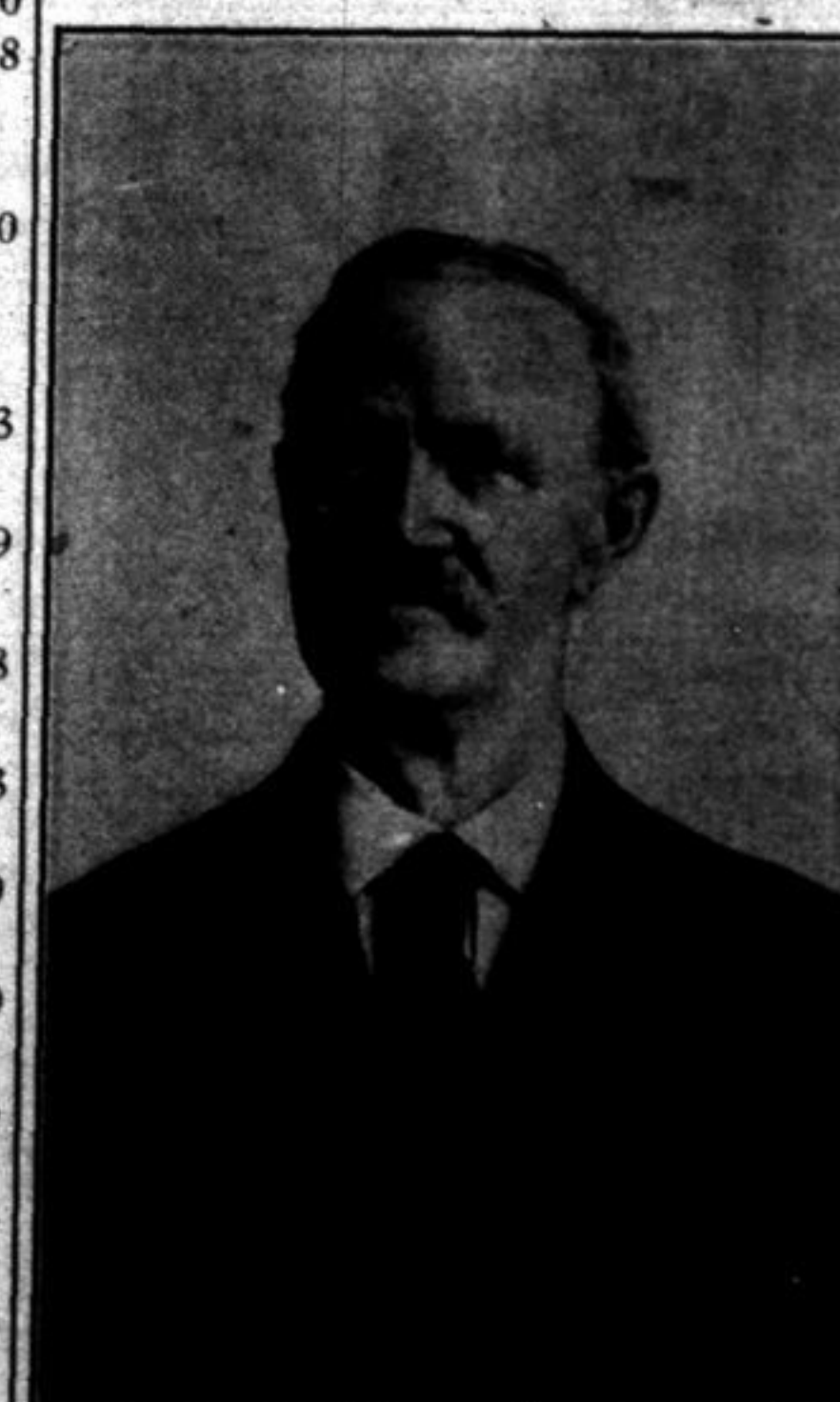
Mr. Everett's weakest points were that he made no announcement of his position on local issues and his committee did not work for his election. It was open to his opponents to suggest any
