Washington, D. C.—S. N. D. North, director of the census, expects to begin taking the thirteenth decennial census of the United States, May 15 and to Illinois he will assign 16 supervisors and approximately 3,800 enumerators, of which one supervisor and 1,500 enumerators will work in Chicago.

Chicago.—An indictment charging manslaughter was returned by the grand jury before Judge Bretano in the criminal court against Policeman Alexander Scott of the Twenty-second street station, who shot and killed Joseph Finn, 3414 Parnell avenue.

James W. Van Cleave of St. Louis, president of the Citizens' Industrial alliance, has resigned because of antagonism shown to him by manufacturers after his fight, as president of the Bucks Stove & Range Company, against Samuel Gompers, John Mitchell and other labor leaders.
