30,000 ARE SLAIN

THAT NUMBER DEAD IN ADANA
DISTRICT ALONE—WIPE OUT
ALL CHRISTIANS.

AWFUL MASSACRE GOES ON

**Moslem Fanaticism is Unabated in
Stricken Turkish Territory—Tarsus
is Scene of Fearful Slaughter—Of-
ficials Not Capable.**

Adana, May 5.—Adana is still law-
less. More people have been killed in
the city. There are 30,000 dead in the
Adana provinces as a result of the
massacres, and 35,000 homeless and
peniless refugees are wandering in
the vilayet.

The deaths in Adana city alone are
estimated at 6,500.

Adana is terrorized by 4,000 soldiers,
who are looting, shooting and burn-
ing. No respect is paid to foreign
properties. Both the French schools
have been destroyed, and it is feared
that the American school, commercial
and missionary interests in Adana are
totally ruined.

The new wall has not as yet in-
spired confidence. There is reason to
believe that the authorities still in-
tend to permit the extermination of
Christians. The troops here are mak-
ing a pretense of throwing "water" on
the flames; instead of water they use
kerosene, and are thus purposely add-
ing to the conflagration.

Apprehension is felt here regarding
the American missionary stations at
Hadjin and Tarsus.

All letters and telegrams sent out
through Turkish channels are cen-
sored.

Tales of Horror Told.
Tarsus, Asiatic Turkey, May 5.—
Authentic details of the atrocities com-
mitted by the fanatical Mohammedans
in the villages and farms in this dis-
trict are now coming in to Tarsus with
sickening abundance. The worst par-
ticulars of these narratives cannot be
mentioned, but they set forth without
doubt that at least 10,000 persons lost
their lives in this province, and some
estimates place the total casualties at
25,000. Villages like Osmanieh,
Bazsche, Hamadeh, Kara, Kristian,
Keoy and Kezolek were actually
wiped out. Each of these places had
populations of from 500 to 600 people.

In one town of 4,000 people there are
less than 100 left, nearly all women
and children. It was the same thing
with the hundreds of chiftlikes, or
farms, that dot this wide and fertile
plain. The slaughter was unsparring;
even Greeks and Syrians were struck
down with the Armenians. Entire
families were burned to death in their
homes. Hundreds of girls and women
were maltreated and carried off to the
harems, where the women were sepa-
rated from the men.

Women at Shootings.
The correspondent was informed
that at one place a party of 100 Ar-
menians surrendered to the soldiers. The
prisoners were taken to an open field,
where the women were ordered to
stand apart from the men. Every one
of the men was then shot. In many
cases they were done to death with
their women clinging to them, trying
to save their lives. A large number
of women were wounded because of
their persistence.

Sixty men who were brought down
into this district from Hadjin are now
held as slaves.

Young Turks around Tarsus traded
Armenian girls for horses and modern
repeating rifles. The entire ten days
seem to have been an insensate orgy
of lust and violence in the name of
race and religion. In the massacres
of fourteen years ago there was no
such desire to kill women and children
as has been evidenced in the last ten
days. There have been numerous in-
stances of the murdering of women
and children with deliberation, and
there are other instances where
women were brought out one by one
and shot down, the bystanders clap-
ping their hands at each fresh execu-
tion.

New Cabinet Formed.
Constantinople, May 5.—The new
cabinet was yesterday organized as
follows:
Grand Vizier—Hilmi Pasha.
Minister of Interior—Ferid Pasha.
Minister of Justice—Kakki Pasha.
Minister of Public Instruction—Azmi
Bey.

The other ministries will be retained
by the last incumbents. Both Kakki
Pasha and Azmi Bey are members of
the committee of union and progress,
and it is expected that this cabinet, be-
ing thus brought into harmony with
the present political situation, will
have a long lease of power.

Unexpectedly ordered to return to
Constantinople, the Turkish naval of-
ficers who came to this country on the
American battleship fleet, left Wash-
ington on their homeward journey.
They were to have visited the princi-
pal cities of the country as guests of
various chambers of commerce and
boards of trade.

ILLINOIS BREVITIES

Springfield.—Abner Smith, former
judge of the circuit court of Cook
county, broke down under the weight
of his sorrow in pleading before the
board of pardons here to keep out of
the penitentiary in connection with
the failure of the Bank of America on
a conspiracy charge wept as he begged
the pardon board to spare him further
disgrace. Gov. Deneen sat by with
E. A. Snelvely and Charles Eckhart,
members of the pardon tribunal, and
was visibly affected by the recital.
Smith's voice faltered and, choking
with emotion, the tears visible, he had
to stop before he ended his plea.
Smith, during his recital, read a letter
from Mayor Busse of Chicago, dated
April 27, in which Chicago's executive
declared he believed Smith to be in-
nocent of any intentional wrong-
doing.

Springfield.—Miss Mildred Coffman
of Chicago was appointed probation
officer of Sangamon county. She will
have charge of the cases of all girls
coming under the jurisdiction of the
juvenile court. The county board of
supervisors recently created the office
of chief probation officer, at a salary
of \$60 a month. To obtain a person
efficient in the work the Springfield
Woman's club voted an additional sal-
ary and Miss Coffman was engaged.
Miss Coffman has been attached to
the staff of Chief Shipley of Chicago.
She is expected to take charge of the
Springfield work at once.

Kankakee.—Awakened from sound
sleep by a peculiar clicking during the
passage of outgoing train which in-
dicated a broken rail, Marshall Pol-
linger, living within 200 feet of the Big
Four tracks at Waldron near this city,
prevented a serious wreck of a Chi-
cago bound passenger train Friday by
telephoning his discovery to agent at
depot. The agent on investigation
found a broken rail at a point of a
dangerous curve, barely in time to
flag the incoming passenger train run-
ning 50 miles an hour.

Belvidere.—Sheriff Hawkey believes
he has arrested the murderer of Mrs.
Margaret Crippen, who was killed near
Rockford. He made an automobile
trip six miles out last night and ar-
rested a man who said his name was
Henry Warner and his home was in
Virginia. Warner's clothing is blood-
stained and he admitted he has been
in Rockford recently. He told col-
lecting stories about his recent where-
abouts.

Easton.—The mystery surrounding
the shooting of London, the four-year-
old son, and Mollie, the six-year-old
daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Dod-
son, residing ten miles south of this
city, has been practically solved. Late
developments in the case show that
the affair was purely accidental and
caused by the explosion of some dynamite
caps which the boy carried in his
hip pocket.

Chicago.—Relatives of the late Daniel
B. Shipman again sought to have
set aside the will under which all but
an insignificant part of the estate of
\$1,500,000 was bequeathed to five
Chicago charitable institutions. This
time proceedings are brought in the
United States circuit court.

Chicago.—Thomas E. Stone,
secretary of the White House, will succeed Maj.
Charles D. A. Loeffer, as doorkeeper
to the president. Mr. Stone has been
at the White House ever since Sec-
retary of the Treasury Cortelyou was
secretary to the president.
