General O. O. Howard

Retired Commander of the United States Army. Addresses in Glencoe.

When Major General O. O. Howard came forward on the platform of the Glencoe Congregational Church last Sunday morning, May 30th to address the congregation, Comrades John Mathews, E. L. Clyde and M. T. Lane who occupied front seats, immediately arose and saluted their former commander in true military fashion. The General hesitated for a moment, looked kindly at his comrades and saluted them in return. The preacher-soldier, retired Major General of the United States Army has often visited in Glencoe at the home of his late brother, General C. H. Howard our own distinguished citizen and neighbor, who died in Glencoe Jan. 27th, 1908.

General Howard several times during his address referred to a number of heroic acts during the Civil war in which his brother Charles H. Howard distinguished himself. He also told of his last meeting with Abraham Lincoln.
