

The visitors were welcomed by Mayor James F. Farrell, the response being given by Gen. Smith D. Atkins of Freeport. The convention was addressed by Attorney General Stead, who delivered his lecture, "The Trail of the Yankee." There was a trolley trip to Marseilles, banquet at Ottawa, tent colony, reception and ball in the evening at the Ottawa Boat club. One hundred editors were in attendance from all sections of the
