"The Cabin" is occupied this summer by the genial cashier of the bank, Mr. Frank A. Andrew and Mr. Benj. Newhall—Ben reports that diving off the bluff is fine, and that Frank can beat the band when it comes to making a cup of tea for breakfast.

Mr Benj. Newhall has just returned from North Maiton Island reports the first steam boat load of hard wood logs being shipped last Saturday—they expect to load one steamer per day for several weeks. The summer resort features of the Island have been discontinued during the logging operations.

Mr. Slyvan Newhall has petitioned the village council to extend Downing Ave. northward through the Newhall and Logan tracts—this property of 43 acres is being subdivided and put on the market in lots of 150 feet frontage.

The Independence Day finance Committee undertook to raise \$600.00 for public entertainment July 5th. It is safe to say, nearly that amount is already in hand and a better time even than last year is promised—the prizes offered are numerous and valuable.

The Congregational Sunday School will be closed during July and August—School Supt. A. B. Rowell, and several other teachers who are also Sunday School workers will be away on their vacations.

Miss Mildred Chamberlain of Chicago will be entertained in Glencoe during the 4th of July holidays by Miss DeLang.

The tax levy made by the Board of Education for the year 1909 is \$12,500.00 for educational purposes and \$11,000.00 for building purposes.

The census of the school district shows a total population of 2,045, divided into 1,008 males and 1,037 females. There are 388 boys and 337 girls under 21 years of age, a total of 725; 120 boys and 104 girls are under 6, a total of 224; leaving 501 of school age.

The population of the Village of Glencoe is 2,047, divided into 1,002 males and 1,045 females.

At the last meeting of the Board of Education held, the annual tax levy was made calling for \$11,000 for building purposes and \$12,500 for educational purposes.

Mr. Barnett for the Finance Committee presented the estimates for the coming year as follows:

As against last year's tax levy, there is a reduction of about \$3,500 because of the completion of the new wing, but this is offset by the fact that first of the bonds, amounting to \$2,500, mature in 1910.

The levy for educational purposes is the same as last year, although the enlargement of the capacity of the school will probably call for some increased expenditure for school work as well as for additional janitor work.

The question of engaging a janitor to take care of the entire building and grounds was discussed at length and the secretary was instructed to insert in the local papers an advertisement for a janitor, the matter to be further considered and disposed of at the next meeting of the Board.

The board also ordered that the school year shall consist of 39 weeks instead of 40 weeks as heretofore, so as to shorten the period of teaching in hot weather and to harmonize with the length of term in other schools.

The question of laying out a new driveway, and proper walks in connection with the new wing was discussed at length but no definite action taken.

The board also authorized the lowering of the old boiler during vacation and cross-coupling it with the new boiler so that in mild weather either boiler can be used to heat the entire building.

Mr. Barnett reported that he had engaged an architect to make a final inspection of the new wing and settlement with the contractors, and under the terms of their contract was authorized when the work shall have been duly approved by the architect so engaged and O'K'd by a special committee consisting of Mr. Andrews and Mr. Barnett.
