Buffalo Bill's Wild West a Pawnee Bill's Far East United Chicago: 73rd Street and So. Park Avenue July 10-13; Riverview, July 14-18

ANNUAL APPROPRIATION BILL. An Ordinance Making Appropriations for Corporate Purposes for the Fiscal Year, from May 1, 1909, to April 30, 1910. Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illinois: Section 1. That the following sums or so much thereof as may be authorized by law be and the same are hereby appropriated for corporate purposes for the fiscal year commencing May 1, 1909, and ending April 30, 1910: Streets, Alleys and Bridges—For constructing, maintaining and repairing streets, alleys and bridges..... \$ 3,000 00 Salary of Officers—For salary of city officers..... 8,050 00 Street lighting—For street lighting purposes..... 4,730 00 Library—For Public Library purposes..... 1,500 00 Bond and Interest—For bonded indebtedness and interest falling due..... 10,600 00 Miscellaneous—For miscellaneous corporate purposes not hereinabove enumerated..... 710 00 Total amount appropriated.....\$33,600 00 Section 2. All unexpended balances of any item or items of any general appropriation made by this ordinance may be expended in making up any deficiency in any item or items in the same general appropriation and for the same general purpose or in a like appropriation made by this ordinance.
