

# GLENCOE NEWS

The Glencoe Village Council meets at the Town Hall Tuesday nights. It's worth your while to go to these meetings. Last Tuesday fully thirty people were present. Glencoe now has a population of over two thousand.

Strange isn't it how excited people get over a school board election or a village council election? In Glencoe these two boards spend about \$30,000 annually of the people's money, and yet nobody seems to care much about it. Would you let your clerks in the office down on your own do this year after year and make no inquiry?

Mr. Long, the tax assessor for New Trier township, was elected last spring, but he does not qualify and serve as assessor till after next January 1910. Mr. MacLean, the present assessor, was elected a year ago this spring and made the tax assessments during the first four months of this year. The records are all complete and were turned into the Board of Review nearly four weeks ago. Any complaints must now be made to the Board of Review at the County Building in Chicago and before August 1st. The personal property tax is fixed every year. The real estate tax is fixed once in four years. The next adjustment on real estate values will be made in 1911.

At the last meeting of the Glencoe Village Council, the question of unequal taxation was discussed by several members, and as a result of this, President Hughes appointed a Committee of seven to go into the subject thoroughly and report, with recommendations, to the Cook County Board of Review such matters as

in their judgment should be reported. The Committee appointed by Mr. Hughes are as follows: Mr. Robert P. Walker, member of the Council and Chairman of the Committee, Real Estate; Mr. Charles P. Killen, member of the Council, Real Estate; Mr. Gordon A. Ramsay, attorney for the village; James F. Dennis, Justice of the Peace, former member of the Council and deputy assessor; James K. Calhoun, former member of the Council and largely interested in Glencoe property; H. M. Robinson, loss adjuster; Frank Miller, of Gutta Percha Rubber Co., Chicago.

The account books of the Village Clerk, Treasurer and the Collector have been audited and a new system of book-keeping is recommended by the Certified Public Accountants. Their bill of \$221. for doing the work was ordered paid by the Council. The better system of keeping village accounts will cost probably an additional one hundred dollars for books and blanks, etc. This recommendation was also approved by the Council.
