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**STATE NEWS**

Jacksonville.—William Brown, for many years general counsel for the Chicago & Alton railway, died at his home here. He was 70 years old. Mr. Brown was a graduate of Illinois college and Missouri university and began the practice of law in Jacksonville. He served as city attorney, state's attorney and was state senator in 1872. He was chairman of the state central committee in 1876 and a member of the law firm of Beckwith & Brown, Chicago, from 1887 to 1889. He became general counsel of the Chicago & Alton on the death of Beckwith and held that position until failing health compelled his resignation in 1905.

Galesburg.—By the terms of the will of Mrs. Mary E. Jones of Knoxville, filed for probate, an estate of \$600,000 was distributed among a large number of beneficiaries. The most important bequest which came as a grateful surprise to the people of Knoxville, was that of \$250,000 for the erection and maintenance of a home there for aged women. It is stipulated that the building must not cost more than \$50,000 and that the income from the balance of the gift will be used for its maintenance. The Presbyterian, Methodist and Christian churches of Knoxville will each receive \$3,000 from the estate.

Springfield.—The American Home Circle and Fraternal Tribunes, the former with headquarters in Springfield and the latter in Rock Island, combined as one fraternal insurance society November 19 of last year, will again become separate organizations as soon as auditors of the companies and the state insurance department have conducted an examination of the finances. Action has been taken by both organizations to adjust the difficulties resulting from the combination. The reserve fund of the Tribunes, it is stated, is the bone of contention between the societies.

Elgin.—Both believing they had made a big mistake in marrying, Mr. and Mrs. William Quived of Elgin agreed to secure divorce proceedings and become legally separated. Later they found that they made a greater mistake and were re-married in Elgin, following a brief courtship for the second time. To friends who called on them, they made the simple announcement, "We made a mistake, we thought, in marrying, but after we separated found that the divorce was really the only mistake, and decided to re-marry."

Taylorville.—The fight between the Taylorville Gas and Electric Company and the Taylorville Railway and Lighting Company for the 20-year street-lighting franchise was ended at the meeting of the city council with the former winning the laurels. The contract of the electric lighting company expired a few days ago and the rival

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**ILLINOIS STATE NEWS**

Chicago.—Suffering from a bullet wound inflicted by her own daughter and which may cause death, Mrs. Gertrude A. Hinkley, a wealthy widow living at 4411 Ellis avenue, made to the police a confession involving high finance, a quarrel and the subsequent attempted murder. She related the story after insisting for hours that she had been accidentally shot. The daughter, Mrs. Marie Mayfield, in whose home at 180 Forty-first street, the shooting occurred, disappeared and Inspector Hunt ordered a dozen detectives to search for her.

Waukegan.—Albert Davis started out at Zion City on an alleged attempt to do up Overseer Wilbur Glenn Voliva, one of whose followers he is. He was so blind with rage he went to the wrong house, that of Mrs. Moore. As no one came to the door he knocked in a pane of plate glass only to discover he was at the wrong place. He rushed off to Voliva's house and tried to assault him, but was overpowered and taken into custody. He was fined but refuses to leave the jail, although his son paid the fine and damages.

Chicago.—The post office department at Washington has issued a fraud order against Charles Ratzel, a broker doing business as Ratzel & Co. at 275 La Salle street, who is accused of selling "inside" information on the wheat market and peddling advice that was supposed to insure his customers against loss. Complaint was made to Post Office Inspector Stuart, and the investigation of his men disclosed that Ratzel always stood to win when the market was played right, but never shared the losses of his customers.

Elgin.—Earl Neely, 16 years old, a Chicago orphan, visiting Rev. E. A. Stickelman here, saved the life of another lad who went swimming with him in the pond at Wing park. He dragged out and resuscitated the victim after he had been under water 15 minutes. Mr. Stickelman heard of the rescue when the boy reached his host's residence. When the minister announced that he would try to obtain a Carnegie medal for the lad, the facts became known, and Earl Neely is being congratulated as a hero.

De Kalb.—Dr. A. J. Freudenberg of De Kalb has brought an attachment suit for \$500 against his former sweetheart, now Mrs. Hazel Soderstrom of Beresford, S. D. The affidavit for the attachment of a lot owned by Mrs. Soderstrom recites that the amount is asked for money, merchandise, etc., advanced to the defendant by the physician. The attorney for the plaintiff explained that the "merchandise" included a valuable diamond engagement ring and other costly presents.

Calmi.—After having lived together for 30 years and then divorced, Bailey McGhee told his former wife that he was lonesome without her and she re-

plined that the same was true of her. McGhee drove to Mills Shoals township on the same mission he had made the same trip for 30 years ago with a marriage license in his pocket and the couple were reunited. They have five children.

Jerseyville.—Thomas B. Ruyie, chairman of the county board of review, received a letter from State Auditor J. S. McCullough, instructing the Jersey county board of review to change the assessed valuation of Jersey county real estate and personal property from a one-fifth basis to a one-third basis.

Carlinville.—County Judge J. B. Vaughn has appointed the following as members of the miners' examining board of Macoupin county: George Hawkins of Stanton, Samuel Duggan of Girard and Thomas Long of Gillespie. The new board will meet in this city as soon as possible after September 1 to effect an organization.

Jerseyville.—At a special meeting of the Jerseyville city council an ordinance was passed extending the franchise granted the Alton, Jacksonville & Peoria Railway Company in 1905 to 1911. It is stated by the management of the company that construction work will soon begin.

Kewanee.—While excavation was in progress for the foundation of a new federal building in the business district here three well-preserved buffalo skeletons were found. A house had been on the site over fifty years.

Rockford.—Gerald Landis Johnson was killed between Colvin Park and Irene by an Illinois Central train he had been sent out to flag. Evidence points to his being overcome by heat as the train approached.

Rockford.—Miss Adella Hammond of Galesburg, a patient at Ransom sanitarium, drove away with a horse and buggy owned by Dr. Ransom. The buggy was found later, but no trace of the girl has been discovered.

Peoria.—Jeannette Dolan, a musical comedy star in one of Richard Carle's companies, and her brother, James Dolan of Chillicothe were drowned at Columbia park while fishing.

Monmouth.—The Democratic judicial convention to select a candidate to succeed the late Justice Guy C. Scott will be held here Thursday, July 29.

Summit.—Brushed off the top of a train by a water tank pipe, William Truddell, aged 28 years, a brakeman, was killed by the fall.

Stewardson.—Grant Deering was drowned in the Richland river while trying to learn to swim.

Vandalia.—Edward Anderson, a merchant at Shobonier, five miles south of here, received a "Black Hand" letter demanding \$100 and threatening his life if he fails to leave the money in a basket in the country at a certain place as directed.

Champaign.—Post Office Inspector George W. Holloway of Danville arrived to investigate the theft of more than \$600 from the University station.

Galena.—Oates O. Kilgore, 22 years old, of Auburn, Me., fell from a moving train here, sustaining injuries from which he died.
