The Lake county portion of the Tenth district, although including a large area, is not very populous, except in some very small inland towns such as Antioch, Wauconda, Fox Lake, Libertyville and Wadsworth. The largest number of voters in the district are located in Zion City, Waukegan, Lake Forest, Fort Sheridan, Highland Park, Glencoe, Winnetka, Wilmette, Evanston, Rogers Park, Ravenswood, Edgewater, Argyle, and Buena Park.
