The New Tariff Bill.

The Payne tariff bill passed a few days ago; was promptly signed by President Taft, who then issued a statement declaring that he believed the bill a sincere effort on the part of the Republican party to make a downward revision and to comply with the promises of the platform. He admits, however, that the measure is not a complete compliance with the promises made, and anybody with some knowledge of the subject can see, even after a cursory examination of the chief features of the bill, that it is one of the most incomplete pieces of legislation that has ever come out of Congress. Just before the passage several jokers were discovered in it and some, it is asserted, still remain there. Mr. Taft, it is feared, has not the backbone he was credited with, although he is built like a man who ought easily stand up straight, and find it rather difficult to "cringe the pliant hinges of the knee that thrift might follow fawning." Before signing the bill he ought to have recalled the words he spoke in Cincinnati after he had been elected president. These were his words:

"Unless we act in accordance with our promises, or if we only keep the word of promise to the ear and break it to the hope, we shall be made accountable to the American people and suffer such consequences as failure to keep faith has always been visited with. It would be better to have no revision at all, unless we are going honestly and fairly to revise the tariff on the basis promised by our party."

The new tariff, it is declared, fixes import duties on 111 articles never before listed and increases from 21 to more than 100 per cent the duties on woollens, and by its maximum and minimum provision it automatically rises the entire tariff 25 per cent after March 31, 1910. As a matter of fact there was not made in the bill a decrease of duty, except, perhaps, in one or two minor instances, which will affect the cost to the purchaser, and not an increase of duty made which will not operate to maintain at their present high level or even to augment them.

The new tariff bill is a fraud because it is not a revision downward in its general character, but a cunning and dishonest revision upward in its features most important to the tiling and consuming classes—Standard Opinion.

Drowned While Bathing Off Glencoe Beach.

Homer Sorber, aged 24, married, and who resided in Chicago, was drowned Saturday evening about 10 o'clock off the beach between the MacLeish piers, George Spiegelhauer, Martin Sorber and his brother Homer came out to Glencoe Saturday evening, built a bonfire and spent the early evening on the beach bathing and expecting to remain under the trees close to the bluff and spend the night camping. At 10 o'clock the three young men went in the lake for another swim. Homer was the farthest out when he called to the other swimmers to "Come on out." They both said they had had enough, and as they got nearer shore they looked around for Homer, but he had disappeared. Martin swam back to where his brother was struggling and tried to bring him in, but he could not get a good hold on his wrist and both evidently very much exhausted Homer slipped away. The night was quite dark and there was no means of making a search for the body at that hour.

Homer Sorber resided at 5613 Ellis avenue, Chicago, was employed as salesman and clerk for the Saratoga Laundry Co. All day Sunday the village police and village officials dragged the lake without recovering the body.

The village council has adjourned till September 8th.
