Sophia Copp Sobey Passes Away

Mrs. Sophia Copp Sobey, mother of Jesse Sobey of Highland Park, passed away Sunday Oct. 3rd at 2:40 A. M. of pneumonia. She was born July, 16, 1839 in Bristol England. Mrs. Sobey spent her married life up to five years ago, when she came to make her home with her son in Highland Park, in Chicago and can rightly be called one of Chicago's pioneers coming to that city in 1850. In 1857 she married Joseph Sobey and to this union eight children were born, five of whom survive her. Those who are living to mourn her loss are: Dr. Richard and Joseph of Chicago, Mrs. P. C. Kenyon of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, John C. of Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada, and Jesse Sobey of Highland Park.

Mr. John C. Sobey of Winnipeg could not be present at the funeral services. The funeral services were held Wed. at 1:30 P. M. at the home of Jesse Sobey 1010 N. Greenbay Road, Highland Park. Rev. E. LeRoy Dakin had charge of the service and Mrs. Jesse Sobey sang. The interment was made at Rose Hill cemetery. Mrs. Sobey was a member of Moody's church in Chicago during his early ministry and throughout her life she displayed a loving christianity one of her rules which she faithfully adhered to was to bear no malice and this was the atmosphere her children lived in.

Early in her married life she was left a widow but she cheerfully took up the task of raising her family alone. Her children pay her the greatest tribute that can be given to a woman. That "she was a loving christian mother."

Receiver Named for Evening News

Landis Appoints a Receiver for Waukegan Paper, after Petition of Voluntary Bankruptcy is filed.

A petition in voluntary bankruptcy was filed in the federal court, Chicago, Ill., with Judge K. M. Landis, this afternoon, by the minor creditors of the Waukegan Printing and Publishing Co. The minor creditors referred to are chiefly Chicago paper companies.

When the petition in voluntary bankruptcy was filed, Judge Landis immediately named a receiver who will take active charge of the publishing plant of the WAUKEGAN EVENING NEWS.

This action upon the part of the minor creditors was taken purposely to forestall the payment of probable excessive judgments which were recently filed in the circuit court of Lake county, by Messrs. Frank W. Moody, Lester O. Moody, Mr. Trestrail, R. B. Dixon et al the former board of directors of the Waukegan Evening News.

The presumption is that the judgments filed are in excess of the real claims held against the Waukegan Printing and Publishing Co.

At the last meeting of the board of Directors, Lester O. Moody, then secretary and treasurer of said company, listed in his annual report the deficits of the company as something like \$2,500.

This deficiency has been swelled two fold within the past week by the prominent members of the stock company who formerly held positions on the board.

It is common talk on the streets to-day that the old faction of board members have adopted the RULE OR RUIN policy and will only be contented when they have exhausted every method to wreck the business. —Waukegan News.
