Shoemaker's Candies.

I well remember some seventy years ago seeing flat candies in use. To produce what was known as the flat candle, which was also sometimes called 'shoemaker's candle,' two newly made 'dips' were pressed close to each other while soft and then again lowered into the hot fat, thus holding them together as one candle with two wicks. The size could then be increased if desired.
