Glencoe Public Library

Arrangements have been made between the Library Board and the School Board, whereby the large classroom in the new wing of the schoolhouse will be immediately equipped as a free public library and reading room. It is the intention to have the library open for two hours on three afternoons of the week and for three hours during three evenings of the week. The equipment will be ordered immediately and, according to present plans, the library will open with seven hundred or eight hundred volumes and with a subscription list of thirty or forty current periodicals. The room will be attractively equipped and lighted and should be very popular as a reading room during the winter evenings. In addition to the books and periodicals, it is the intention to supply suitable games and in every way to make the place inviting.

As the cost of the first equipment, in the way of furniture, book stacks, desks, chairs, etc., will be quite large, the amount available for the initial purchase of books will be limited. The Library Board will, therefore, greatly appreciate any contributions in the way of books which may be offered by any residents of Glencoe and will look after the rebinding of any good books contributed which may require repairs. The Library Board is prepared to at once receive and take care of any book contributions which may be made. All such offers should be addressed either to Mr. O. R. Barnett, President, or Mr. Charles B. Barnes, Secretary of the Library Board.
