### HIGH SCHOOL NOTES.

Mr. F. B. Williams, who has been with the high school six years as teacher of manual training and assistant to the principal, has secured leave of absence for the rest of this year. Mr. Williams wishes to follow out a line of work he entered into last summer with the Pfanzstiel Electrical Laboratory. In the absence of Mr. Williams, Mr. Charles Smith of Cleveland, Ohio, has been engaged to teach the classes in manual training. The substitute teacher is a man of excellent scholarship, experience and reputation.

A dainty card has recently appeared, dated November 6, 1909, and bearing a brand new name of interest to all—Betty Louise Hill. The students had been searching all history—ancient, mediaeval and modern—in search of a proper cognomen.

Admiral Ross will speak on the training for the American navy and will illustrate his talk with numerous slides. The lecture will be of interest to all who have visited the great naval school, and young men may also learn something of the possibilities of the navy as a career.

The Referee is read far and wide. Last summer a high school boy from far away California came here with a knowledge of our students gained from the Referee. And recently the editor-in-chief, Miss Blanche Mason, received a letter of appreciation from a gentleman in Savannah, Mo., whose daughter is exchange editor on the Savannah high school paper. The gentleman complimented particularly the stories by Misses Ruth King and Mary Sedgwick.

The public high school does not encourage students over sixteen years old to remain at books when they lack either the intelligence or the character and application necessary to profit by the education. But to a boy of the right sort the loss of opportunity to attend the local high school is an irreparable injury unless he goes to school elsewhere. The

man who takes his twelve or fourteen year-old boy out of school to exploit his wages should feel the contempt of the community.
