The Congregational Church of Glencoe has called the Rev. Douglas H. Cornell of Michigan City, Ind. to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Dr. Darling. Mr. Cornell has accepted the call and will begin his ministry in Glencoe on the 20th of February. He is at present pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Michigan City where he has been for the past five years, doing a very successful work. The committee of nine delegated by the church to find and unanimously recommend a man for the place, were heartily united in the choice. The report of the committee describes Mr. Cornell as a man of about 35 years of age, of fine personal appearance, pleasing address, good education, a reader who makes use of what he reads. He has been especially successful with the young people in his present pastorate, and is regarded as an exceptionally strong man. He is said to be public spirited, modern and wide-awake in his thinking and methods and a leader among men. All of the members of the committee were pleased with his preaching. It would seem that the church is to be congratulated upon the choice and it is hoped that the pastorate may be a most successful one in every respect.

He scoured the country and found many farmers who were "willing to sell coal" and food and some passengers declared that they could spend a week in their car home if they received such treatment.

The drifts of snow, some of them, says Mr. Bock, were 12 feet high and the cars were off the track. He sent to Highwood for the wrecker and after several hours he found it in a big drift near Edison Court.

When he got to Winthrop Harbor he picked up his chief dispatcher, Wm. Hasney, who finished the journey with him. Mr. Hasney is still confined to his bed on account of the severe exposure. Mr. Bock's action has won the friendship of all the passengers who came in for a share of his free lunch. It would be well to remember, when complaining of the service of the road that they too have their troubles.
