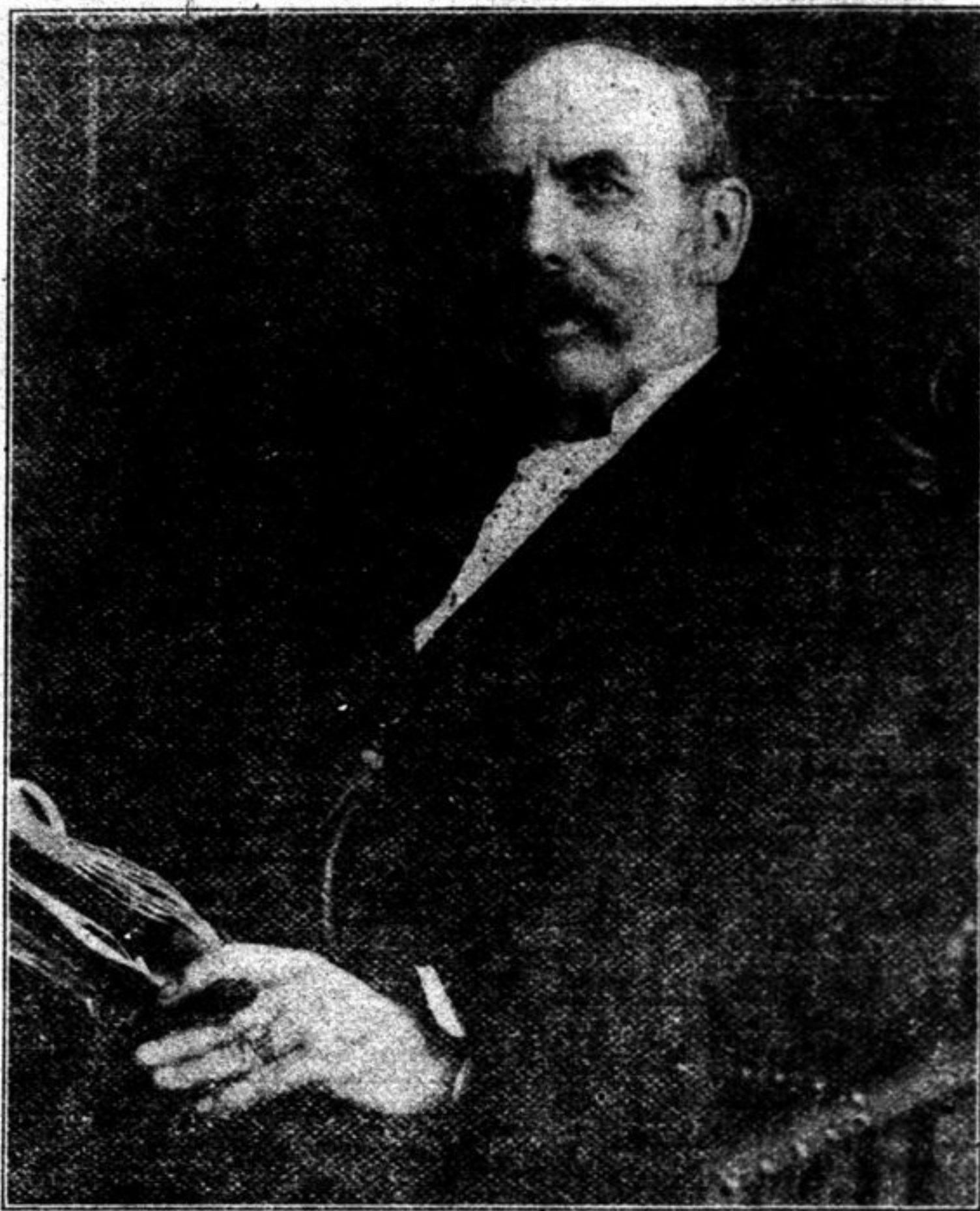

White Slavery Only Part of the Evil

ZION CITY, Feb. 3, 1910.

The white slave agitation is but an incident in a much greater subject of an almost universal evil. For one alien imported this infamy there are a thousand betrayed or led into a vile life on our own land. The whole country is honeycombed with a false standard of morality which paralyzes evil in every suggestive form, crowding the divorce courts and filling our jails and insane asylums.

We have not yet learned how to deal with the evil at its root. We aim at the rescue of a few and go on manufacturing slaves of our girls and encouraging vice among young men. Mr. Crittender who died recently, left two million dollars to support rescue homes and never gave a thought to the stopping of the flood which makes rescue necessary.

This was part of a powerful statement made by Rev. W. Burgess, the Shakespearean lecturer who has been here all week giving a course of lectures. His portrayal on Wednesday night of the character of Isabel in "Measure for Measure" as a type of pure womanhood convicting a licentious judge was particularly fine.
