Notice is hereby given to all parties interested that on January 9, 1909, the City of Highland Park filed a petition in the County Court of Lake County, Illinois, praying for the ascertainment of the just compensation to be made for private property to be taken or damaged for acquiring land necessary for construction of purification works for Ravinia sewer system, No. 155, in the City of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illinois, and that thereafter commissioners were duly appointed by said court to investigate and report the just compensation to be made for private property to be taken or damaged for said improvement and what property would be benefited by such improvement, and that thereafter due and proper proceedings were had in the said County Court in accordance with the requirements of the statute in such case made and provided, wherein judgment of confirmation for benefits to the property assessed therein for benefits was duly entered in the amount of \$5,000.00, and judgments on awards for said property therein to be taken or damaged were duly entered in an amount aggregating \$16,400.00 resulting in a deficiency between said judgment of confirmation for benefits and said judgments on awards for property to be taken or damaged amounting to \$11,400.00; whereupon the said court referred said matter to the commissioners heretofore appointed to report whether or not the premises already assessed would be benefited to any greater amount and to what amount, if any, or whether or not any other property not heretofore assessed will be benefited by said improvement, and if so, to what amount, and in accordance with their findings to make an additional assessment to make up said deficiency, to-wit: \$11,400.00, and, pursuant to said order of the court, the said commissioners have made said report and additional assessment for said deficiency and have filed the same in said court on the 9th day of February, 1910.

Application will be made to the said County Court for confirmation of the said deficiency assessment on the 16th day of March, 1910, at 10 o'clock a. m., or as soon thereafter as the business of the court will permit. Objections may be filed to said deficiency assessment on or before the 16th day of March, 1910.
