**TIED BY CONGRESS**

PENNSYLVANIA REPRESENTATIVE ATTACKS ADMINISTRATION ON FLOOR OF HOUSE.

**TO NAME RULES COMMITTEE**

Republicans and Democrats Will Hold Caucuses Wednesday Night—Regulars Will Occupy Platforms in the Insurgent Regions.

Washington, Mar. 23.—Referring to President Taft as "a rather pliant executive," and characterizing former President Roosevelt as "the greatest insurgent of them all, who taught the insurgents how to 'insurge,'" Representative A. Mitchell Palmer (Dem.) of Pennsylvania attacked the administration from the floor of the house. In introducing his attack upon the Republican organization and the administration measures, Mr. Palmer said that the country could expect little real benefit from "this show of effort on the part of the president to redeem the pledges of the Republican platform."

**President Bound Hand and Foot.**  
The speaker said he did not impute to the president any lack of good faith, but, he added, "any student of recent and present conditions in the Republican party must realize that, however much the president may desire to carry out the promises of his party in relation to these measures, he has bound himself hand and foot to an organization in congress which has demonstrated on innumerable occasions that it can be true to nothing except its own false traditions."

**Fix Time for Caucus.**  
The house Republicans will hold their caucus for the selection of the six-Republican members of the new committee on rules Wednesday night. The Democrats also have agreed tentatively on Wednesday night for their caucus.

All shades of party politics engaged in informal individual conferences over the situation in the house. There was speculation over the probable personnel of the new rules committee under the Norris resolution. There were various slates.

"If I were going to forecast the Republican members of the committee," said a prominent western Republican representative who has been in close council with colleagues in the house and intimately associated with the speaker, "this would be my guess: Dalzell of Pennsylvania, Walter I. Smith of Iowa, members of the present committee; J. S. Fessett of New York, Denby of Michigan, McKinley of Illinois and probably Gardner of Massachusetts."

"The last named has all along refrained from anything of personal antagonism to the speaker, and is the only insurgent acceptable to all of the regulars."

**Chautauqua as Arena.**  
Well-known Republican statesmen, it is announced, here, are to stump the country on the Chautauqua circuits next summer under the auspices of the Republican congressional committee, of which Representative McKinley of California is chairman. As far as possible, it is understood, "regular" speakers will enter ballparks where insurgents abide and where there is threatened disaffection on account of the new tariff law. On the other hand, it is reported, the Chautauqua circuits are to be enlivened with some of the insurgents. Senators La Follette of Wisconsin and Cummins of Iowa being among the leaders who are to talk to the people during the hot months.

**AMERICAN SAVINGS IN LEAD**

Figures issued by New York Bankers Show Average Deposit is \$380.

New York, Mar. 23.—Figures made public through the savings bank section of the American Bankers' association show that the average deposit in American savings banks is almost four times as great as the average for the other countries of the world and that the average deposit per capita is six times as great in this country as abroad. The savings deposits of the world aggregate more than \$15,000,000,000, and of this sum more than \$5,500,000,000 belong to Americans. One American in every six of the total population has money in a savings bank and the average deposit is \$380.

**Arrest Two for Tunnel Hold-Up.**  
Seattle, Wash., Mar. 23.—After a search of nearly two years detectives of the prosecuting attorney's office have arrested one man and have warrants for the arrest of another on the charge of robbing a Great Northern express car in the famous tunnel hold-up of 1908.
