AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$10,000 PARK BONDS.

Be It Ordained By The City Council Of The City of Highland Park:

That there be borrowed on the credit of the City of Highland Park the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) for the purpose of acquiring and improving lands for public parks in and for said City, and that bonds be issued, therefore; that such bonds be dated May 1, 1910, bear interest at the rate of Four and One-Half Per Centum (4½ per centum) per annum payable semi-annually, be numbered from One (1) to Ten (10) inclusive, of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) each; to mature One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) on May 1, 1916, and One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) on May 1st of each year thereafter up to and including May 1, 1925; and that this ordinance be submitted to the voters of said City at the regular election to be held in said City on Tuesday, April 19th, 1910.

AN ORDINANCE FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$36,000 BRIDGE BONDS.

Be It Ordained By The City Council Of The City Of Highland Park:

That there be borrowed on the credit of the City of Highland Park the sum of Thirty-Six Thousand Dollars (\$36,000) for the purpose of constructing bridges in and for said City, and that bonds be issued, therefore; that such bonds be dated May 1, 1910, bear interest at the rate of Four and One-Half Per Centum (4½ per centum) per annum, payable semi-annually, be numbered from One (1) to Thirty-Six (36) inclusive, of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) each; to mature in the order of their number Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000) May 1, 1916, Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000) May 1, 1917, Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000) May 1, 1918, Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) May 1, 1919, Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) May 1, 1920, Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) May 1, 1921, Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) May 1, 1922, Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000) May 1, 1923, Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000) May 1, 1924, and Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000) May 1, 1925; and that this ordinance be submitted to the voters of said City at the regular election to be held in said

City on Tuesday, April 19th, 1910.

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$4,000 SEWER BONDS.

Be It Ordained By The City Council Of The City Of Highland Park:

That there be borrowed on the credit of the City of Highland Park the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000) for the purpose of improving the sewer system of said City, and that bonds be issued, therefore; that such bonds be dated May 1, 1910, bear interest at the rate of Four and One-Half Per Centum (4½ per centum) per annum, payable semi-annually, be numbered from One (1) to four (4) inclusive, of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) each; to mature in the order of their number One, One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) May 1, 1919, and One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) on May 1st of each year thereafter up to and including May 1, 1922; and that this ordinance be submitted to the voters of said City at the regular election to be held in said City on Tuesday, April 19th, 1910.

AT NAPLES IN APRIL

ROOSEVELT AND FAMILY WILL REACH ITALY EARLY NEXT MONTH.

TAKES RIDE ON DONKEYBACK

Scene of Great Battlefield of Omdurman is Visited by Former President and Party—Servants Who Accompanied Him on Hunt Rewarded.

Khartum, Mar. 16.—To-day Mr. Roosevelt and party visited Omdurman. The hills of Kerreri, seven miles from Omdurman, mark the site of the great battle of Omdurman on September 2, 1898, when the khalifa's army was annihilated and the rule of the khalifa brought to an end. Mr. Roosevelt inspected the khalifa's house and met the local celebrities. The trip to Omdurman was made in the sirdar's yacht Elfin and the other seven miles north of Kerreri on donkeyback.

In the afternoon a game was played for the benefit of the Gymkana polo grounds and after that he visited the American mission. In the evening he will be the guest of the Khartum club at a dinner at which covers will be laid for 60.

Busy Times for Roosevelt.

Col. Roosevelt was especially busy, occupying the intervals between planned excursions to points of historic interest in receiving callers and making reply to such of his voluminous correspondents as he had been able to examine.

He summoned to him the native servants who had accompanied him throughout the expedition and bade them good-by. Each received a present of cash from Col. Roosevelt and a gift from Mrs. Roosevelt.

The tentative plans of the Roosevelts provide for their departure from here on a special train Thursday night.

On the way to Cairo a stop of one day will be made at Assuan, Upper Egypt, on the east bank of the Nile, and two days will be given over to a visit to Luxor.

The party will sail for Naples early in April.

Promises to Visit West.

F. G. Bonfils of Denver, who came here to meet Col. Roosevelt, had an interview with him and presented a petition from the chambers of commerce of Kansas City and other western cities asking the former president to return to the United States by way of San Francisco. Mr. Roosevelt replied that it would be impossible for him to follow the suggestion, owing to his engagements, including his presence at the marriage of his son, Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., and Miss Eleanor B. Alexander, which is due to take place in June. If possible, however, he said he would visit Denver and Cheyenne during the Frontier day celebrations in August.

YALE BOYS FREE RUSS REBEL

Establish Alibi for Tschalkovsky and Effect Acquittal at Trial in Europe.

New Haven, Conn., Mar. 16.—Cablegrams from Russia declare that Nicholas Tschalkovsky, Russian revolutionist, was acquitted at his trial through evidence placed before the Russian government by Yale undergraduates. The charge against Tschalkovsky was that he was concerned in a conspiracy hatched February 13, 1907. The defense was an alibi.

Copies of the Yale Daily News for February 14, 1907, were put in evidence, showing that Tschalkovsky was in New Haven the night in question.

ACCUSED BROKER OF CRUELTY

New Jersey Authorities Say New Yorker Rode \$1,000 Horse So Hard It Had to Be Shot.

Lake Wood, N. J., Mar. 16.—A warrant for the arrest of Hosmer James Barrett, member of the New York stock exchange, has been obtained charging him with riding a jumper so hard that it had to be killed by an agent for the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals. Mr. Barrett hired a horse at a riding academy for a cross country ride. When the horse was returned to the stable it fell exhausted. It was valued at \$1,000.

WANT TAFT AT AERO FEAST

Airship Experts Will Discuss Advisability of Nation Having Air Fleet.

New York, Mar. 16.—Question of the advisability of providing the United States with a suitable aeronautic equipment for national defense will be discussed at the banquet of the Aero Club of America March 24. An effort is being made to obtain the attendance of President Taft. Secretaries Dickinson and Gen. Leonard Wood.

BOY WITH BROKEN NECK WELL

Ten-Year-Old Brooklyn Lad Recovers After Lying Nine Months in Plaster Cast.

New York, Mar. 16.—The surgeons at the Seney hospital are elated over the recovery of Louis Graf, a ten-year-old Brooklyn boy, who was taken a year ago with a broken neck, caused by a fall from a cherry tree. Near death for weeks, now, after nine months, passed with his body incased in a plaster cast, he is declared sound.

Here's Your Chewing Gum.

New York, Mar. 16.—One-fourth of the population of British Honduras spends its life obtaining and exporting material for the chewing gum which Americans consume year after year. According to J. R. Boatman, an expert from Belize, capital of British Honduras, who is in New York.

Noted Physician Dead.

New York, Mar. 16.—Dr. Martin Amador, well-known Brooklyn physician and cousin of Dr. Manuel Amador, first president of the republic of Panama, is dead at his home in Brooklyn. He was 53 years old.
